DEADLY ALLIGATOR DUEL

After a Battle Lasting Two Hours and a Hal'

The Florida Saurian Was Killed by His Bronx Park Rival.

New York, July 15.-A Florida alligator measuring 8 feet 9 inches from the tip of his tail to the end of his nose arrived at the New York Zoological Park a week ago. He was captured and sent north from Florida. The park people christened him Ike. Until yesterday Ike was kept in a tank by himself and seemed for all the world to be pleased with himself and purpose with a vote of 500,000 lire. It all around him. Yesterday it was decided to put him in the big pit with an old alligator which has been in the park collection some time, and whose name is Pete. Pete is 9 feet 7 inches over all. Hitherto he has had the pit all to himself and was thought good-natured. But when the new alligator made his appearance yesterday Pete didn't like it a bit. The two alligators looked at one another from different ends of the pit for some time. Finally Pete, diving under water reappeared within a few feet of Ike and opened his enormous jaws so that Ike could see down his throat. It was a gage of combat, and Ike accepted it. A fight followed that lasted for two nours and a half. The water in the pit was beaten into foam and was soon dyed red with the blood of the animals that flowed freely from the wounds made by the combatants. It wasn't long before the attendants heard of it. and four keepers hurried to the pit armed with clubs and spears. The pit about 10 feet deep and 25 feet long, and the fighting animals were fighting all over it. The clubs and even the sharp-pointed spears failed to separate them, and a rope was resorted to. After many attempts one of the keepers managed to lasso the big alligator. Then, while the others tried to keep Ike away with the spears and clubs, two of the keepers tried to drag Pete along to the end of the tank. They had almost succeeded when the

alligator got away and went and was tolled only on Ascension Day. after his antagonist. Despite the rope around his neck, which had worked down so far as to leave his jaws free, Pete met the rush of the other, and opening wide his enormous jaws, caught the other right around the Four-Fifths of Those Who Survived The Story of the Murder of Explorer neck. There was a crunching sound, and it was all over. When Pete finally let go his hold it was seen that the new alligator had been choked

Fisherman Meets Death in Trying to Pick Up Big Fellow.

Entangled in Harpoon Line Under Water Till Life Had Gone.

Gloucester, Mass., July 16. - The drowning of a man by a swordfish is reported by the crew of the schooner Wm. B. Keene, which arrived in port

The Keene was fishing on the southeast part of George's on Saturday, when an enormous swordfish was sighted. A harpoon was driven into dispatched in a dory to pick up the fish. He had gone about a quarter of a mile from the vessel when he observed the buoy floating.

Just as he set out to pick up the fish he was cautioned by the master against getting his leg entangled in the rod line. There were 78 fathoms of rod line connected with the barpoon.
