A great future is predicted for oil The utmost secrecy is otherany observed as to the results of the oil fuel experiments carried out by vessels of the British navy, but there is apparently some reason for the belief that they have been of a highly satisfactory nature.



The new Donvig non-capsizable lifeboat, which has just passed successfully through a series of trying tests in the English Channel, is a spherical vessel, so constructed that it remains upright in the most tempestuous seas and cannot be drawn under a ship, no matter how strong the draught. The boat has a double flat bottom inside, and can carry 30 days' provisions. It is divided into four tanks filled with fresh water, which, as it is used, is replaced by sea water, supplied by pumps. This water acts as ballast and holds the boat true. It is believed that the Donvig boat will gradually replace the ordinary type of lifeboats on sea-going vessels.

EDUCATION BILL PUSHED THROUGH

Passed Committee Stage After His Anti-Home Rule Speech 45 Days' Debate.

Argentina Accepts British Conditions-Cattle To Be Imported Into Britain at Once.

London, Nov. 21. - After 45 days' discussion of details, the education bill has passed the committee stage in the House of Commons, the final vote that the bill be reported to the house being 212 to 86. Notice was given that several amendments would be made in the report stage of the measure.

CONDITIONS ACCEPTED. The President of the Argentine Republic has sent a telegram, in which he accepts the conditions named by Right Hon. Robert William Hanbury, president of the board of agriculture, under which Argentine cattle may be imported into England. The conditions are the Argentina shall adopt the British diseases of animals act, inspect her own flocks, and prohibit the moving of infected animals from the districts in which they are located. It is expected that this will result in the importation of cattle from Argentina within three months, and that it will materially affect the importations from

the United States and Canada. THE SHIPPING TRUST. As the date draws near for the completion of the great shipping trust deal, the interest naturally grows keener, and the opening of the career of the International Mercantile Marine Company is awaited with speculative wonder. There have been persistent rumors on the stock exchange that the United States financiers are experiencing difficulty in finding money to complete the purchase of the White Star Line by Dec. 1, but these rumors are dismissed at Morgan's London offices as absurd, and it is authoritatively stated that all the money is here and that everything is ready for the completion of the deal at the appointed

time. In well-informed circles it is believed that the completion of the purchase of the White Star Line will be at once followed by an advance in transatlantic freight and passenger rates.

TURKS WILL BE QUIET NOW. A special correspendent of the London Times, who has been visiting Persia, took the opportunity on his way to India to visit Koweit on the Persian Gulf, and in a dispatch from Kurrache describes the conditions there. He says that Mubarakh, Sheikh of Koweit, no longer appre-hends direct aggresion on the part of the Turks, provided that British warships continue to give him support, and that his Wahabi allies secure the mainland from the invasion by Ibn El Rashid. The chief danger, according to the correspondent, arises from conspiracies on the neighboring Turkish territory, such as an abortive attempt on land and water in September, which attempt was baffled by the prompti-tude of the British warship at Koweit. Nothing has been done by the Turkish Government to punish the offenders, and the obstructive attitude of the Vali of Busra was evidently due to in-direct instructions from the Porte. Germany, adds the correspondent, is not alone in taking a special interest in the Koweit, as the coveted terminus of a projected railway. Two Russian consuls on the Russian ships have visited Sheikh Mubarakh, but their attempt to impress him with their superior advantages of Russian friendship and protection were unsuc-

Belfast, Nov. 21.-Thomas W. Russell, Unionist member of Parliament, was stoned by a mob after he had addressed a meeting at Dromore. The rioters attacked the hall where Russell made his speech and caused him to seek refuge in a neighboring house, whence he tried to escape in a carriage. The mob discovered him and bombarded the vehicle with stones. Russell was struck on the head, but

was not seriously injured. Thomas W. Russell, Liberal Unionist member for South Tyrone, began another land campaign near Belfast early in October. He declared that 80 per cent of the landlords were ready and suggested a new basis for land purchase, under which the state would \$700,000 among widows and orphans in give \$50,000,000 for the benefit of the insurance. landlords. Russell is opposed to home rule for Ireland.

Edinburgh, Scotland, Nov. 20. - Emperor William, on his way to embark on board the imperial yacht Hohenzollern, lying in the Firth of Forth, arrived at Dalmeny today, and was met by Lord Rosebery. As his majesty's carriage was leaving the station the hoses attached to it became frightened at the waving of the colors of the detachment of the Black Watch forming the guard of honor. The postilions lost control of them, and they got mixed up in the crowd. cident was only averted by the alertness of Lieut.-General Sir Archibald Hunter, who seized their heads and managed to control them.

The Chinese Government refused to punish these officials as requested by the British minister, and the Governor of Funan, in an official communication regarding the matter, used the term "barbarians" to designate the dead missionaries. This incensed the British minister, and he again called on China to punish the officials. The Imperial Government persisted in it being done, and the British made a naval demonstration. This brought the Chinese Government to time, and the officials were ordered to be exe-

THOUSANDS WERE KILLED

Guatemala Refugees Confirm the Society Women Throng the Old Accounts of Ruin Caused by Volcanic Eruption.

San Francisco, Nov. 21.-The first of the refugees from the devastated lands of Guatemala arrived here yesterday. When they sailed Nov. 7 the volcano was still smoking and rumblings of thunder and flashes of lightning gave evidence of more eruptions to come. They escaped to the seaside with little more than the clothing they wore, transportation being so difficult as to preclude the carrying of baggage.

The refugees confirm stories of the loss of life. They say that the victims, for the most part, are Indians. Thousands of Indians were asphyxiated or buried in the sand. Miles of plantations are under ashes and absolute ruin is the lot of many planters whose all was invested in the Fincas. the desolated sections, robbing and murdering refugees on the road and looting the abandoned and desolated
