#### SUMMARY OF WAR NEWS.

During the last twenty-four hours there has been a dearth of definite information from the Far East. Rumors are flying of a Russian triumph at Hakodate, a Japanese port, which, it is claimed, has been destroyed by the Vladivostock fleet. As this squadron was declared to be icebound the report is probably untrue. Should this news be correct it is bad news for the Japs, as the squadron could do immense damage to the Mikado's coast and shipping, and make a conjunction with the Russian fleet en route from Europe. Four Russian battleships are said to have captured or sunk a Japanese merchantman and the latest details of the Port Arthur fight say three of the Mikado's torpedo boats were destroyed with great loss of life. It is claimed a Jap battleship was sunk. While laying submarine mines in Port Arthur for the benefit of the Japs the Russian transport Yenisei got tangled up with the apparatus and was blown to pieces. A St. Petersburg dispatch says a number of officers perished. At Port Arthur the Russians fired on a British ship, but later apologized for the mistake. Nothing has been heard of the rival armies which are supposed to be somewhere in Northern Korea, possibly close to the Yalu River. Revolutionists are active in Russia, and missionaries in China fear an early Boxor outbreak. Russian officials blame the Czar's peace talk for the recent defeats but will probably look elsewhere for a scapegoat. Britain is considering Mr. Hay's proposal as to integrity of China.




