All Europe Would Be Freed of Scares and the Burdensome Cost of Armaments.

Berlin, Nov. 15 .- The political emancipation of Germany has become the issue of the hour. That is the form which the unanimous national rage of the last fortnight is rapidly assuming. It was bound to come. A people of high civilization and boundless prosperity was certain, sooner or later, to demand political liberty un-

der the principles of self-government. Germany, despite its Reichstag, its local legislatures, and its complicated constitution, is politically an autocracy. It is the cleanest and best organized autocracy in the world and its subjects heretofore have been docile and contented. So they would have remained, perhaps indefinitely, so long as the national prestige and national honor remained unsullied and

a policy of wisdom and dignity had been pursued by their rulers. The moment their ideals were violated, however, it was inevitable that there would come an overwhelming demonstration. The fact is that patriotism is a stronger motive than personal loyalty in the heart of the German people in such an outburst as we now are witnessing. It is so strong and universal that superficial observers might easily imagine it would speedily accomplish its object and that we soon would see a democratic form of government like the English estab-
