A mushroom shape with the brim dented in four places is much worn by young girls.

Black velvets will be exceedingly popular all season.

The big hat of the period of Louis XVI. is a favorite.

The Hussar turban has no brim, but its crown is eight or ten inches high.

The chenille pompon is coming into great favor. The chenille is sewed on bands of ribbon about an inch wide. The loops of the chenille are about two inches long and must match the covering of the hat in color. A handsome hat is made of blue velvet with a blue chenille pompon and a carbochon of gold.

The newest auto bonnets are made without a foundation and are shirred on heavy cords.

A new hatpin has a head of very finely carved ivory.

A felt mushroom hat trimmed with a band of wide satin ribbon caught in a big chou at one side is the smart style for the little girl of 10 or 12 years.

Pompons of peacock feathers are a popular trimming.

The crowns of some of the turbans are covered with row after row of narrow shirred ribbon or of narrow ruching.

The toque is a fashionable hat for morning wear.

Some of the new hats whose brims turn up like spreading wings are named after various airships and aviators.

Although the craze for things Chanterel has abated and the one popular fowl is now pronounced "too common," the influence of the Rostand play is still seen in the abundance of fancy feathers.

The sombrero of some of the all-black hats of the early fall will be relieved by the introduction of flowers and leaves of finest gold tissue.

Ostrich plumes will be extensively worn this year, and it may be well to note that some of the finest plumes on the market are made for men—that is, for the chapeaux of the Knights Templar.

The popularity of the gray shades has brought the use of steel ornaments into great vogue.

Narrow black tie buckles are used a good deal for catching the ends of turban draperies together.

Big white silk poppies with black silk centres are among the striking flower trimmings for the black hat.

The big cactus dahlia in black is another popular flower.

Huge silk violets in deep violet and in black are used a good deal.

Plain ribbons, striped ribbons and ribbons with Persian designs are all popular for hat trimmings.

Chocolate Bread Pudding.

One ounce bitter chocolate, three-fourths cup stale bread crumbs, two cups scalded milk, one-third cup sugar, one egg, one-eighth teaspoon salt and one-half teaspoon vanilla. Soak the bread in half the milk until it is soft, melt the chocolate by putting it in a cup over boiling water, add the sugar and the remaining milk, stirring in the beaten egg, add the salt and vanilla and bake in a pudding dish until the pudding has set. Serve with cream.

Escalloped Meat.

Two cups cold cooked meat, one and a half teaspoons salt, one-fourth teaspoon pepper, one tablespoon onion chopped fine, three tablespoons butter, three tablespoons flour, one and a half cups hot meat stock and two cups bread crumbs or cracker crumbs. Melt the butter and stir the flour into it; then stir in the meat stock, add the seasoning, and mix the meat with it. Put half the crumbs in the bottom of a baking dish, pour in the meat mixture, cover the dish with the rest of the crumbs and bake in the oven 25 minutes.

Pop-overs—One-half teaspoon salt, two eggs, one cup milk, one cup flour, Beat eggs and add flour and milk alternately. Bake in slow oven forty-five minutes in hot pop-over irons.

Francian Potatoes—Prepare as for boiled potatoes and parboil ten minutes; drain and place in pan in which meat is roasting; bake until soft, basting with fat in pan. Bake for forty minutes. Sweet potatoes may be prepared in the same way.

Grilled Sardines—Drain twelve sardines and cook in chafing dish or saucepan until heated, turning frequently. Place on small oblong pieces of dry toast, and serve with maitre d'hotel or lemon butter.
