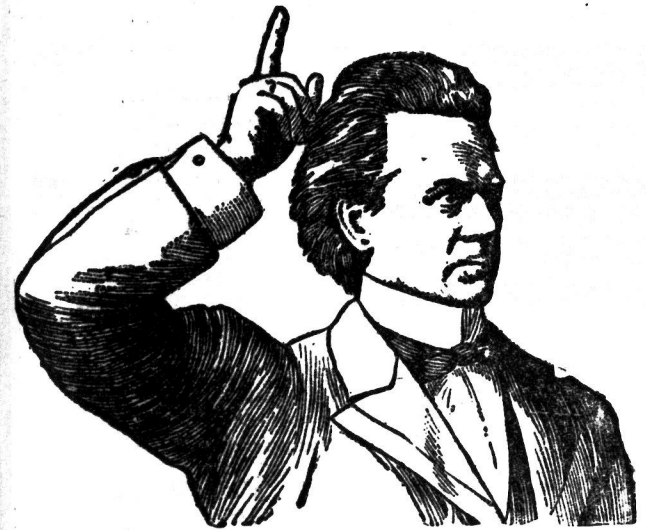

WILD CATTERS AT WORK AGAIN

Grand Trunk Pacific Takes Legal Action Against Private Companies Using Its Name.

Winnipeg, Man., June 28.—The Grand Trunk Pacific has issued formal warnings against real estate men who are offering in the name of the railway company to sell lots in bogus townships along its lines in the western provinces, and has given notice that all such people will be prosecuted in the courts.

D'Arcy Tate, solicitor for the company, states that actions are now pending in the courts against six or seven persons who are using the company's name, and that all wild catters will be brought to justice in an endeavor to prevent the repetitions of such misrepresentations as have already occurred in a number of cases.

This announcement is official, and the company itself has established all divisional points and stations, and that the sales will be made through its bona fide agents.

The use of the name by land companies is described as intended to mislead innocent purchasers, for the most part those who wish to buy land in the increase in value following settlement of the surrounding country, and the rapid growth of the towns themselves. Where there is no station service there will be no town, and such sales, therefore, would be fraudulent and lead to loss. The public is notified that all such intending purchasers should communicate direct with the railway's agency, the Transcontinental Townsite Company, at Winnipeg, and get the facts.

WESTERN TRAIN HELD UP MAIL SACKS LOOTED

Robbers Miss a Shipment of \$400,000 in Gold Dust.

[Canadian Press.] Glendale, Ore., June 28.—Apparently mistaking the first section of north-bound passenger train No. 16, on the Southern Pacific Railroad for a south-bound train, said to be carrying a shipment of \$400,000 in gold dust from Seattle to San Francisco, two robbers held up the northbound train last night near West Fork, an isolated station in Cow Creek Canyon.

The robbers rifled the mail car, blowing up the safe, and made away with the registered mail. They tried to secure entrance to the express car, but were foiled by Messenger Robb, who refused to open the door despite threats that they would use dynamite if he resisted. The robbers, after fruitlessly prying with a crowbar at the side door of the car, finally abandoned and decamped with the loot secured from the mail car. The amount taken by the robbers cannot be ascertained at this time. This train carries in its registered mail the cash from Southern Oregon postoffices to Eugene, Ore., which is the depository, and

this was probably included in the mail stolen.

The robbers boarded the train at West Fork, while the engine was taking water. Soon after it had got under way they crept over the tender into the cab and directed the engineer to stop the train. This done, one of the men kept the engineer and fireman under the cover of his revolver, while the other went back and unlocked the mail baggage and express cars. Then the engineer was ordered to pull these cars some distance up the track, where he was again ordered to stop. The robbers went back to the mail car and lining the mail clerks up took the registered mail pouches and dynamited the mail car safe. The noise of the explosion warned Express Messenger Robb of what was taking place, and when the demand came for him to open his door he made no reply.

The conductor of the train, as soon as he discovered what had taken place went back to West Fork, where he notified Glendale and surrounding points. Posses have been organized to pursue the robbers.
