## MONTREAL POLICEMEN

They Kill One Instantly, Fatally Wound the Other-Suspects Under Arrest.

[Canadlan Press.]

Montreal, March 11 .- All over the city nd in the surrounding suburbs the police are today hunting for four burglars, who early this morning shot and killed Constable Bourdon and fatally wounded Constable Guyon, who tried to stop them while they were escaping after robbing a butcher shop at St. Laurent. The robbers were in a sleigh.

Constable Bourdon was shot in the throat and abdomen, and died shortly after his admission to the Roya! Victoria Hospital. Constable Guyon was shot just above the heart, and no hope is held out for his recovery.

Shot From Sleigh Receiving word from Chief Lecavalier, of St. Laurent, that burglars in a sleigh were hurrying to the city, Constables Honore Bourdon and Auguste Gyuonof, of the Cote des Nelges station, an outlying police beat, started a search. They discovered the burglars and headed them off. Guyon jumped onto the sleigh and was immediately greeted with fusillade of shots, several of them hitting him and causing him to fall the ground. Bourdon also attempted to stop the sleigh and was shot down.

#### TWO BRITISH OFFICERS KILLED DURING FLIGHT

Were at High Altitude When Their Aeroplane Collapsed.

[Canadian Press.] Salisbury, Eng., March 11 .- Two more officers of the British army flying corps were killed here today. Capt. C. R. W. Allen, of the Welsh Regiment, and Lieut. J. E. G. Burroughs, of the Wiltshire Regiment, while flying over the military aerodrome on Salisbury Plain, were hurled to the ground from a high altitude, owing to the collapse of their

The cause of the accident was the breaking of the rudder bar of a Gov-ernment-built biplane piloted by Capt. Allen, who was carrying Lieut. Burroughs as a passenger.

A Tragic Sequel, London, March 11.—In recording the three fatalities to British army aviators within two days the London newspapers says they make a tragic sequel to the congratulations expressed to the country last week by Col. Zely, secretary for war, on the fact that no deaths of army aviators had occurred within a year.
The secretary for war attirbuted this record to the superior safety of British aeroplanes, and declared that flying was now as safe as, or safer, than voyages in submarines.

Churchill Criticised. The recent flying exploits of Wirsten Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, are the subject of much critieism, in that a British cabinet minister has no right to risk his life in foolhardy exploits.

#### 'UNEMPLOYED ARMY' MAY ABANDON MARCH

[Canadian Press.] Sacremento, Cal., March 11.— Gen eral" Kelley's proposed march to Washington, D. C., with an "army" of unemployed men may be abandoned, according to reports today. Of 1,700 men driven from this city across the Sacramento River into Yolo County by the authorities on Monday many deserted. With "General" Kelley, the leader, and his lieutenants in jail, charged with vagrancy, many of the men are losing in-
