Of my own knowledge, I suppose, I know a dozen families in which women are addicted to the habit

Ottawa, Ont., April 14.-Rev. Father Roy, rector of Ottawa University, in an official statement announces that Rev. Father Stephen Murphy has been appointed to succeed Rev. Father James Fallon, and that the students of Ottawa University could have learned this had they asked for information before striking this morning. The demonstration, according to Father Roy, is only a boylsh prank, and is unlikely that any attention will be paid to it by the University authorities if the boys return to study this afternoon.

HARRY K. THAW'S PETITION GRANTED

Judge Aldrich Allows Writ of Habeas Corpus, But Gives No Order for Prisoner's Bail or Release.

[Canadian Press.] Concora, N.H., April 14.—Harry Kendall Thaw's petition for a writ of habeas corpus was granted by Judge Edgar Aldrich, of the United States district court, today. The court said, however, that no order would be issued for the prisoner's discharge from custody until arrangements had been completed to take the case to the United States Supreme Court on appeal. Thaw's petition for admission bail, the court left undetermined, taking the ground that it would be more appropriate for this to be passed upon by the supreme court.

The result of the decision is that Thaw's guardianship and condition will be unchanged for the present; but that his potition for a writ of habeas corpus will go to the highest court in highest and the land, with a decision of the lower
