

FOE'S LOSSES IN 15 DAYS 35,000

Half a Dozen of Germany's
Finest Divisions Completely
Decimated.

FRENCH OFFICIAL REPORT

Paris Denies Statements of
Advances Made By the
German Staff.

PARIS, May 6.—11:15 p.m.—An official note issued tonight says:

"The German general staff persists in giving false details concerning their offensive engagement. During the last fifteen days the enemy has suffered complete checks and severe losses.

"The German attack on April 22 by two army corps using asphyxiating gas bombs has as its object the piercing of the Ypres front. The greater portion of the prisoners captured from us were overcome by fumes. We suffered no check. The rapidity of our counter-attacks prevented the enemy from establishing a strong position on the right bank.

"In these combats we inflicted heavy losses on the enemy. Our actual front was established only two kilometers (about a mile and a quarter) from the original front. Our men are now provided with means to protect them against similar attacks with asphyxiating bombs.

"Being unable to pierce our lines and compel us to give up possession of Ypres, the Germans are now attacking a distance of 38 kilometers (about 23½ miles) on Dunkirk. This gun, which ceased firing after two days, did damage of no military importance.

Three Divisions Decimated.
"On April 23 the Germans endeavored to retake Les Boezes with three divisions. Heavy fighting occurred in the neighborhood of St. Emy and Calonne and on Les Eparges heights, but the Germans were repulsed by counter-attacks. The number of losses was shown by great heaps of bodies. It may be said that the three divisions were completely decimated.

"Important progress has been made by the Allies in the Bois de Prete, the Bois d'Ally and the Bois de Montmorency. On April 26 the Germans attacked and captured the summit of Hartmannsweilerkopf, but their success was brief. We retook the summit the following day, forcing the enemy a distance of two hundred metres beyond the crest. We also made progress in the region of Schnepfen-Rietkopf, where guns of the enemy were captured.

"To sum up: During the last fifteen days the enemy has attempted a heavy offensive which we speedily broke down. The total of the German losses in the heights of the Meuse, in the Woëvre and the Vosges has been more than 35,000. At no part have they broken through our lines. They have taken no important position from us. They have allowed half a dozen of their finest regiments to be decimated."

BRITISH LAND IN SPITE OF ENEMIES

Australians Jump Into Water
and Wade Ashore At
Dardanelles.

CAPTURE TURK TRENCHES

British Press Representative
Tells of Daring Feats of
Australians.

LONDON, May 7.—12:45 a.m.—A British press representative with the allied forces in the Dardanelles sends a long and interesting account of the landing of the Australians and New Zealanders on the Gallipoli Peninsula north of Gaba Tepe at daylight on the 25th of April.

"The night before," the account says, "the entire fleet of warships and transports left their rendezvous, the crews of the warships cheering the soldiers on to victory, while bands played them out with an endless variety of popular airs.

"Early in the morning the men were aroused from their slumbers and served with a hot meal. They were all cool and collected. At 2:05 o'clock in the morning the order was given to disembark. The boats, which were manned by blue-jackets and commanded by young midshipmen, slowly were towed to the beach by pinnaces.

"The first shot was fired as the boats were nearing the beach, and the firing gradually grew in volume as the colorists got a footing on land and let forth a hearty cheer.

First Three Wounded.
"The first authentic news we received on board the battleship London, of the landing, came with the return of our boats. The steam pinnace came alongside with two recumbent forms on her deck, and a small figure, pale but cheerful and waving his hand, astern. They were one of our midshipmen, just 16 years of age, who was shot through the stomach, but regarded his injury as a fitting consummation to a glorious holiday ashore than a wound, and the chief stoker and a petty officer.

"All three were wounded by that first burst of musketry, which caused many casualties in the boats just as they reached the beach. From them we learned that all the tows had almost reached the beach, when a party of Turks, entrenched almost on the shore, opened a terrible fusillade from their rifles, and also from a maxim.

Many of Men Hit.
"Fortunately most of the bullets went high, but, nevertheless, many men were hit as they sat huddled together, 40 or 50 in a boat.

"It was a trying moment, but the Australians volunteered to go as a man to the occasion. They waited neither for orders nor for boats to reach the beach, but springing out into the sea, they waded ashore, and forming some sort of a rough line, rushed straight on toward the flashes of the enemy rifles.

"Their magazines had not even been charged, but they just went in with cold steel. And I believe I am right in saying that the first Ottoman Turk since the last crusade, received an Anglo-Saxon bayonet in him at five minutes after 5 o'clock on the morning of April 25.

"It was over in a minute. The Turks in this first trench were bayoneted or ran away and their Maxim ammunition was captured.

"Then the Australians found themselves facing an almost perpendicular cliff of loose sandstone with thick shrubbery, and somewhere half way up the enemy had a second trench, strongly held, from which they poured a terrific fire on the troops below, and the boats pulling back to the destroyers for a second landing party.

"Here was a tough proposition to tackle in the darkness; but the colorists went about it in a practical way. They stopped a few moments to pull themselves together and to get rid of their packs, and then charged with their rifles.

No Attention To Fire.
"Then this race of athletes proceeded to scale cliffs without responding to the enemy's fire. They lost some men, but it did not worry them. And in less than a quarter of an hour the Turks were bayoneted or in full retreat.

"The boats landed rather farther north of Gaba Tepe than was intended, but this proved a blessing in disguise, for there was no glacial down which the Turkish infantry could fire and the broken ground afforded good covering. In the early part of the night, very heavy casualties were suffered in the boats which conveyed the troops from the destroyers, tugs and transports to the beach. As soon as it became light the enemy's sharpshooters concentrated their fire on the boats when they go near in. The landing continued throughout the day under this fire, which could not be checked.

"The Australians finally established themselves on a ridge and advanced northward and throughout the day confused fighting took place, the ships assisting the troops with the fire from their guns. The Turks only had a comparatively weak force actually holding the beach. They seemed to have relied on the difficult nature of the ground and their scattered sniping to delay the advance, until they had brought up reinforcements from the interior.

Australians Almost Outfitted.
"Some of the Australians who pushed inland counter-attacked and were almost outfitted by these incoming reserves, and had to fall back after suffering very heavy casualties.

"It was then the turn of the Turks to counter-attack, and this they continued to do throughout the afternoon, but the Australians never yielded a foot of ground on the main ridge and reinforcements were continually poured up from the beach.

"As soon as the light became good the Turks endeavored to reach the field guns. This shrapnel fire was incessant and deadly. The Turkish guns, however, finally were put out of action by the turn of the Turks to counter-attack, and this they continued to do throughout the afternoon, but the Australians never yielded a foot of ground on the main ridge and reinforcements were continually poured up from the beach.

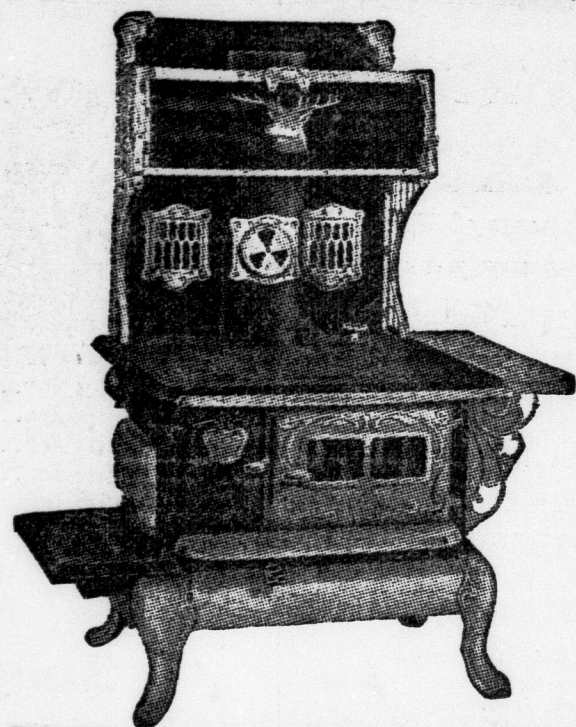
"The Turks brought up reinforcements, and the pressure on the colorists became greater, but they held on in the face of the difficulties, which included the landing of water, ammunition and supplies on the up the bluff, several hundred feet high, to the firing line, while the troops were exposed to an incessant shrapnel fire.

"Another problem was taking the wounded back to the ships, but the line, while the troops were the greatest feat, cheering the ships as they passed in their boats."

ALLIES ESTABLISHED ACROSS GALLIPOLI ON THE THIRD DAY

Premier Asquith Tells of Successful Landing and Consolidating Positions.

LONDON, May 6.—4:20 p.m.—The operations in the Dardanelles are being pressed forward under highly satisfactory conditions, Premier Asquith told the House of Commons this afternoon in the course of a statement upon the combined naval and land attacks on the Gallipoli peninsula.

The Premier spoke in part as follows: "At daybreak of April 25 the landing occurred, the troops making use of six landing places. By nightfall 28,000 men had been disembarked in the face of a fierce opposition by infantry and artillery entrenched behind successive lines of wire entanglements.

"The leading troops of the 29th Division were held up all day to the west of Seddud Bahr, but at sunset they succeeded in a fine attack along the heights which made possible the taking of a good position covering the disembarkation of the remainder of the division.

Iran and New Zealand corps went ashore at Gaba Tepe, at half past one o'clock in the morning in complete silence. The enemy opened a heavy fire at point blank range but the beach was rushed with good effect and the attack carried out with the utmost dash up the slope.

"French forces effected a landing at Kunt Kale, and advanced with great gallantry. Every report speaks of the magnificent co-operation of the naval forces. I regret the casualties were very heavy, including the death of Brig-Gen. Napier. During April 26, the disembarkation continued. The troops ashore were subjected to continuous and determined attacks from the enemy, but these in every case were repulsed with heavy losses. The 29th Division, under command of Gen. Hunter, with great valor carried the Turkish position at Seddud Bahr, which consisted of rocky ravines, ruined houses and wire entanglements.

Across the Peninsula.
"By evening of April 27 the 29th Division was firmly established across the peninsula, having advanced two miles from the point of landing.

"They were joined by French troops who, having fulfilled the task of silencing the hostile batteries on the Asiatic coast which interfered with the landing on the Gallipoli Peninsula, had recrossed the Straits. The Australian and New Zealand corps defeated every counter-attack and steadily gained ground.

"The disembarkation continued April 28 and 29. By May 2 a further advance had been made by the French and British troops on the southern end of the peninsula, and the Australian and New Zealand corps had been reinforced by the Royal Naval Division. The positions everywhere had been consolidated.
