### IRISH SEA DISASTER: MANY LIVES LOST AS CRASH SINKS SHIPS

Steamers Retriever and Connemara Collided in Irish Channel Last Night, Both Vessels Going Down, With Heavy Loss of Life.

London, Nov. 4 .- In one of the worst gales ever known in the Irish Sea, the British steamship Connemara, with passengers and a cargo of cattle from Greenore, Ireland, for Holyhead, Wales, collided last night, just outside the Carlingford Bar, with the British steamship Retriever, laden with coal. Both vessels sank immediately, with an estimated loss of life of

London, Nov. 4, 1:30 p.m. - The London and Northwestern Railway steamship Connemara, bound from Creenore to Holyhead with passengers, has collided with another vessel, and it is feared the death roll is about 300.

The Connemara collided with the steamship Retriever in the Irish Channel last night. Both vessels were sunk. So far is is known, there is only one survivor from both ships.

A Lloyds dispatch from Belfast says the collision occurred off Carlingford Lough, an inlet on the Irish coast between the counties of Down and Louth. The Retriever was inward bound.

A few bodies have been washed ashore on the County Down coast. The dispatch says it is feared 300 lives have been lost.

### Great Adriatic City of Austrians Now Under Siege—Blockaded From Sea by Italian Fleet, and Land Communications by Railways and Passes Are Dominated by the Enemy-30.000 Austrians Fall in Great Italian Sweep.

### (Special Cable to The Advertiser.)

Rome, Nov. 4.—Noon.—Long range Italian guns have been shelling the inner defences of the Austrian seaport of Trieste today, and the Italian fleet has practically completed a blockade of the approaches to Trieste harbor. Austria's principal Adriatic seaport is practically under siege.

### ALMOST ENCIRCLED.

The Italians now control most of the passes and railway lines north and northwest of Trieste. The city is almost encircled. Austrian troops valiantly defending the position have been terribly decimated, in some cases whole battalions being lost or destroyed.

Estimates of Austrian killed, wounded and cap tured during the new sweep by Gen. Cadorna's army in this direction vary from twenty to thirty thousand Austrians killed, wounded or captured. Italian loss is also very severe, but the gains are considered pro portionately great.

### ROME REJOICING.

Expectations here are that Trieste, which has a population of 130,000, three-fourths of whom are Italians, will be under the flag of Italy within a week on two. There is great rejoicing here.
