## HEALTH BOARD CALLS FOR VOLUNTEERS TO HELP FIGHT EPIDEMIC

Mayor Little Says Hospital Trust Has Been Negligent-Situation Not Bad Enough For Closing Orders-"Don't Worry" Best Prescription.

Volunteer nurses to check the spread of influenza were called for by the board of health at a special meeting Thursday afternoon. The Red Cross is to be asked to take charge of the work and organize the volunteers.

Conditions were not such as to warrant closing schools, theatres, churches and other public buildings, the board stated. Special regulations will be applied to these places, however.

The volunteer nurses will be asked to take care of cases of illness which are not serious enough to demand expert attention. This is expected to relieve the demand on hospital accommodation, which is needed for more serious cases. Three school nurses will be sent to supplement the staff at the emergency hospital in connection with Victoria Hospital.

Mayor Little declared he was far from satisfied with the manner in which

Mayor Little declared he was far from satisfied with the manner in which the situation had been handled by the hospital trust. He declared that plans made Saturday for using a military wing as a temporary hospital to meet the emergency, had not been carried out. He stated that if proper arrangements could not be made by the present management then the management would be changed. would be changed. "It me no wonder the finances of the

city are in an outrageous condition when things are handled in this manner." he said. "The hospital trust was preparing to open this wing as a ward of 80 heds on February 15, to take care of soldiers now at Tecumseh. Barracks. I see no reason why it could not be ready for 80 civilians in the same time."

Cooking is Difficulty.

The chief difficulty is apparently with the cooking. Superintendent Heard reported earlier in the meeting that the wing was being supplied with uncooked foods from the main kitchen of the hospital. He claimed that the staff was undermanned, but was supplying 450 people from a kitchen meant to supply 200.

"It is a funny thing," continued the mayor, "that this wing has been lying idle for a month, while patients have been turned away from the hospital. We had to chase all over the town and arrange for an emergency hospital in the military barracks at Carling Heights. Then we find that there is room for a hundred beds at Victoria. It was understood that the hospital should supply 80 beds for soldiers, but the transfer of these cases can be postponed for a time. If they were ready to take care of 80 soldiers, they can take care of 80 citizens, and they'll do it, too."

Other members of the board were not Other members of the board were not Other members of the board were not putter in accord with the mayor. Both E. H. Russell and Mrs. Partridge said they thought the understanding was that the hospital trust would furnish the ward, but that it absolutely could not undertake to do the cooking as the building.

Keep Schools Open. H. Hayman, chairman of the board of education, appeared before the health authorities to offer co-operation. His offer of the services of the school nurses was accepted. The general opinion of the board was that closing the schools was not necessary. Mr. Hayman asked to issue instructions to have all sick children sent home immediately.


