HEALTH BOARD CALLS FOR VOLUNTEERS TO HELP FIGHT EPIDEMIC

Mayor Little Says Hospital Trust Has Been Negligent— Situation Not Bad Enough For Closing Orders— "Don't Worry" Best Prescription.

Volunteer nurses to check the spread of influenza were called for by the health board at a special meeting Thursday afternoon. The Red Cross is to be asked to take charge of the work and organize the volunteers. Conditions were not such as to warrant closing schools, theatres, churches and other public buildings, the board stated. Special regulations will be applied in these places, however.

The volunteer nurses will be asked to take care of cases of illness which are not serious enough to require hospital attention. This is expected to relieve the demand on hospital accommodation, which is needed for more serious cases. Three school nurses will be sent to supplement the staff at the emergency hospital in connection with Victoria Hospital.

Mayor Little declared he was far from satisfied with the manner in which the situation had been handled by the hospital trust. He declared that plans made Saturday for using military wings as a temporary hospital to meet the emergency, had not been carried out. He stated that if proper arrangements could not be made by the present management, the management would be changed.

It was no wonder the finances of the city were in an outrageous state when things are handled in this manner, he said. The hospital trust, which had been in operation for 15 years, had been a failure. It was a waste of money to keep it, and it was time to close it down. He said he would not be ready for 80 civilians in the same time.

Cooking Is Difficulty.
The chief difficulty is apparently with the cooking. Superintendent Heard reported earlier that the kitchen of the wing was being supplied with cooked foods from the main kitchen of the hospital. The kitchen staff was undermanned, but was supplying 450 people from a kitchen of 200.

Mayor Little stated that the board of health had engaged a cook for the hospital trust, but that the cook was not working. He said he would not be ready for 80 civilians in the same time.

Superintendent T. H. Heard made no reply to the mayor's statement, but left the room.

It is a funny thing," continued the mayor, "that this wing has been lying idle for a month, while patients have been turned away from the hospital. We had to chase all over the city to get an emergency hospital in the Heights. Then we find that there is a room for a hundred beds at Victoria. It was understood that the hospital should supply 80 beds for soldiers, but the transfer of these cases can be ready to take care of 80 soldiers, and they'll do it, too."

Other members of the board were not quite in accord with the mayor. Both C. H. Russell and Mrs. Parkin said they thought the understanding was that the hospital trust would furnish the ward, but that it absolutely could not undertake to do the cooking as the majority of the kitchen was already overtaxed.

Keep Schools Open.
H. Hayman, chairman of the board of education, appeared before the health authorities to offer co-operation. He said the services of the school nurses were available. The board of the board was that closing the schools was not necessary. Mr. Hayman asked to issue instructions forbidding the closing of the schools.

DOLLAR DAY WAS A BIG SUCCESS FROM EVERY VIEWPOINT

These two days follow each other at six-month intervals, and are looked forward to by merchant and consumer. This year the first of these days ended up to expectation.

For some days the businessmen were preparing for this day and had most of their goods brought to open view and ticketed, so that the purchaser could not fail to notice the price. Some goods were sold at half price, and others at several times less than the ordinary selling price.

Believing that "the early bird gets the worm," many of the shoppers were in the streets before the stores opened in order to be the first to select the places in which they had seen bargains shown on the previous evening.

Forced To Close Doors.
Some of the retail houses were forced to close their doors to keep back the crowds until they were able to handle them. Buyers were let out of the back doors, and as soon as the congestion in the stores was removed, prospective ones were allowed in the front entrances.

As the day hurried to a close the bargain counters showed through the rapidly diminishing piles of goods. The phenomenon was accounted for by the numbers of parcels being carried home by the general public.

Not only the citizens but visitors from all parts of Western Ontario shared in the spoils of the day. The day being a market one, the farmers brought in their wares and with the cash obtained by the sale of their produce added to other substantial amounts of cash which they had brought with them. The rural inhabitants loaded their vehicles with goods which the retail merchants had displayed.

From every point of view the day was a successful one, and had it not been for the sickness in the city the Dollar Day 1920, February 12, would have been the most successful one ever staged.
