St. Thomas Trades and Labor Council Ask Consideration For City Official.

HAS SERVED 30 YEARS

Oppose Chamber of Commerce Taking Part in Community Chest Organization.

Special to London Advertiser. ST. THOMAS, April 9 .- Fair play for W. J. Shaw, license inspector, health inspector and relief officer of this city, who is under the fire of Ald. M. Penhale, chairman of No. 4 committee of the city council, is being demanded by the labor men of the city, who discussed the matter, along with other civic questions at the last meeting of the trades and labor council.

Almst 30 Years. Because of Mr. Shaw's long service in the offices he holds, covering a period of almost 30 years, the mem bers of the trades council believe that he should be given every opportunity to defend himself against the charges made against his department before any action is taken by the city fathers to secure his resignation. In the resolution drawn by the labor men a strong plea was made for British fair

play on behalf of Mr. Shaw. The trades council was unanimous in the belief that a majority of the citizens would not tolerate Mr. Shaw's dismissal. Mr. Shaw was eulogized at the meeting as the hardest-worked man of all the city officials, and that he had always given his best attention to all work pertaining to his position.

The council is also opposed to the chamber of commerce taking any part in the proposed community chest fund organization. As there is a committee on charity in the city council the members could not see why it should not take the initiative in the formation of such an organization. The chamber, they thought, should confine itself to the business for which they claimed it was formed, namely, the industrial development of the city.

Holds Oklahoma Oilman Justified in Shooting Flying Colonel.


