COUNCIL DIVIDES ON QUESTION OF NEW CITY HALL

**Mayor Determined To Start
Construction Despite Opposi-
tion of Aldermen.**

The ratepayers of this city—or at least the majority of them—are witnessing another strange spectacle. This time the members of their city council are involved.

On one hand can be noticed, Mayor Wenige and half of his council actively preparing for the early construction of a new city hall on the McCormick site. On the other, will be found the other half of the council preparing to battle this move to the finish, and they promise legal proceedings in order to halt all progress that may be made.

Not Disturbed.

Mayor Wenige states again quite definitely that he is in no way disturbed by the threats and manoeuvres

of his opponents, and in answer to a question today was as confident as ever that "The cornerstone of London's new city hall will be laid during Old Home Week in August."

Mayor Wenige fears not, evidently, the opposition to the early construction of a city hall, this has asserted itself in the city council. And he is confident that he has the majority of the citizens with him in this deal.

Fails To See Reason.

"There must have been 25 persons call me up yesterday," he relates, "all of whom commend those members of the council and myself in our efforts for a start this year. Some of them question why there should be all this opposition from some aldermen in view of the sweeping majority of 4,000 at the last municipal election that the people did not want the hall on the Spencer site, but on the McCormick property. They ask me what is behind all this opposition."

In the meanwhile the preliminary work will continue. Ald. George Burdick, chairman of the special city hall committee, is still confined to his home after an operation, but directly he is able, he will plunge into the fight again. A meeting will be held and a tentative program outlined for the immediate consideration of the council.

MRS. MARY WHITE.

The funeral of Mrs. Mary White, widow of the late William White, who passed away at the home of her brother, George Elliott of Agincourt, on Monday last, was held this afternoon from the residence of her son, Claude White, 474 Princess avenue.

The services at the house and grave were in charge of the Rev. W. R. McIntosh of the King Street Presbyterian Church, and internment took place in Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

Mrs. White is the daughter of one of the first members of the White family who made their home in Canada. The first White family landed in the Dominion 125 years ago, and settled in Scarborough Township. Mrs. White has lived in Agincourt for the past ten years, but prior to that made her home in London.

Audience Resents Remarks About Ingersoll Candidate

**Gathering Threatens To Throw A. T. Walker Out of Hall For
Alleged Story Against J. V. Buchanan.**

Ingersoll, June 21.—A near riot occurred here last night when the crowd attending the political meeting held in the interests of J. V. Buchanan, the Liberal candidate, resented the remarks of A. T. Walker of East Oxford, and threatened to throw him out of the hall.

Mr. Walker is alleged to have made insinuations regarding Mr. Buchanan for the past week or so, which were detrimental to his character. Last evening the popular Liberal candidate demanded that Walker explain his tactics. Before the latter could rise, however, the crowd, irritated by his demeanor, attempted to baw him out. Mr. Buchanan pleaded for a fair hearing, and Mr. Walker was allowed to explain the unaccustomed of gossip attributed to him.

At a past meeting Walker had asked, "Where was Buchanan on the night of Wednesday, June 6th?" Last night he cleared the Liberal candidate of all possible reflection by stating there was no truth in the allegations he is said to have been circulating for some time.

When the voters heard the admission that he was plainly resentful and Mr. Buchanan was compelled to hold them in check, fearing bodily harm to Mr. Walker.

Dozens of former U. F. O. supporters came to the Liberal candidate after the meeting and assured him of their support. Many stated they were disgusted with the campaign of anathema and contumely being conducted by his political opponents.

Silver.**

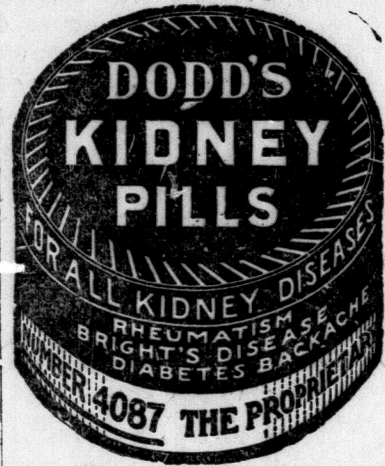
STIFF COMPETITION

MRS. SWINDALL SCORES DRURY EXTRAVAGANCE

Mrs. E. K. Swindall, a supporter of Richard Chapple, Liberal candidate for East Middlesex, addressed the workers at McCormick's factory during the lunch period today.

The meeting was held on the factory lawn and the speaker was given a splendid reception.

She was introduced by the Liberal candidate, Mr. Chapple, who stated that he was not only an east end Liberal, but also a neighbor of the McCormick employees, his store being near the factory, had given him a speaking acquaintance with over half the employees. ASK AUTHORITIES CURB SMUGGLING ON ST. LAWRENCE

**Ottawa Section Retail Mer-
chants' Association, Urges
Woman Customs Officer.**

COMPETITION UNFAIR

Brockville, Ont., June 21.—A resolution calling for the taking of immediate steps to curb smuggling from the United States into Canada along the boundary line, and with particular reference to the St. Lawrence River frontier, was adopted at the annual meeting of the Eastern Ontario and Ottawa section of the Retail Merchants Association held here yesterday. The resolution points out that smuggling, especially by women, has become general at all points of the boundary line, leading to a depreciation of legitimate enterprises to the Dominion government and unfair competition for retail merchants, and calls upon the Ontario provincial board to take steps to have a permanent woman customs officer stationed at Brockville and Prescott.

The sending of a monster delegation of retail merchants to Toronto to wait upon the provincial government with a view to having transient traders, hawkers and peddlers placed upon an equal taxation footing with permanent retail merchants is forewarned in a recommendation passed to the provincial board by the section, which also placed itself on record as being in favor of the continuance of the manufacture and sale of oleomargarine in Canada.
