

BISHOP TO DIRECT ROME PILGRIMAGE

Rt. Rev. M. F. Fallon, Bishop of London, To Lead Canadians.

The pilgrimage will be the leader of the pilgrimage of Roman Catholics of Canada and the United States to Rome in 1925, which is Holy Year in the Roman Catholic church.

This is the second time that Bishop Fallon has been spiritual director of a pilgrimage to Rome.

Catholics of Canada who are making a holy pilgrimage to Rome learned that the first step toward the inauguration of the jubilee year commenced the work of loosening the masonry of the "holy door" which guards the most sacred reliquary of the Catholic church.

The last jubilee year was 1900 and on that occasion thousands of Catholics from Canada and the United States thronged to Rome for ceremonies. This year a holy pilgrimage has been proclaimed again and on the invitation of his holiness the pope the archbishops and bishops of Canada arranged a pilgrimage.

The bishops of Ontario received a special invitation from the pope.

INSTALLMENT ON DEBT PAID BY GREAT BRITAIN

Semi-Annual Payment Made by J. P. Morgan & Co. To U. S.

Associated Press Dispatch. New York, Dec. 15.—For the first time since Great Britain's debt-funding agreement with the United States has been in operation, payment of the semi-annual installment of \$91,655,000, applicable to principal and interest, was made today without the use of Liberty bonds.

Of Great Britain's payment, \$22,000,000 was applied to principal and \$69,655,000 to interest. The use of Liberty bonds in lieu of cash was prevented by the premiums which these obligations have been able to command this year.

The total revenues from foreign debts were scaled an additional \$300,000 by payments from Finland, Lithuania and Hungary.

TORONTO TO HAVE SURPLUS OF \$4,000,000 FOR YEAR

Canadian Press Dispatch. Toronto, Dec. 15.—A surplus of almost four million dollars for the city of Toronto at the end of the year is indicated. Out of \$30,000,000 available for current purposes at the beginning of 1924, only \$26,000,000 had been expended by the end of November, with overfalls of \$4,000,000.
