BORIS SARAFOFF SLAUGHTERS TURKS

Leader Comes to Rescue of **Band and Kills Hundreds** of Enemies.

Sofia, Oct. 12.—The details of the new Austro-Russian reform scheme are awaited here with the greatest interest. A despatch from Sofia says that the Austrian and Russian ambassadors will present their proposals to the Porte today. The government here is taking the strictest precautions to prevent insurgents from crossing the frontier. One band is reported to have been fired on by Bulgarian troops near Rita today while trying to assist a crowd of fugitives who were being pursued by Turks. This incident is considered to be evidence of the government's correct intention. Desperate fighting is reported to have taken place at Sdlezi, in the district of Dibra, on October 5. Three bands engaged a body of 600 Turks and lost 25 men. After several hours' fighting, Boris Sarafoff, with reinforcements of 600 insurgents, arrived on the scene and killed all save forty Turks.

STRANGE SHOOTING AFFAIR IN PARIS

Roumanian Singer Found Dead In Apartments of a Leading Hotel.

Paris, Oct. 12.—The mysterious shooting of a Roumanian singer.
