Barnes, who was employed as janitor of the Hiawatha ACpartment Building, 258 East 27th-street, was murdered in a brutal manner last night in the basement of the build-ing and an elaborate effort was made by his slayer, and accessories after the fact, to conceal the crime by hiding the hacked and mutilated corpse in a hole under the sidewalk in South Park-avenue. The parking case in which the remains were hidden was discovered this morning, and to-night every person except.
