Some more interesting details of "Buskin at Corpus" appear in The Pelican Record for December. The writer, "C.P.," says:

One night when he was showing up Turner's picture of Richmond in Yorkshire, our late good bursar, himself a Yorkshireman, explained that at a certain point in the picture a railway bridge was now thrown across. Ruskin was heard to mutter under his breath the single word "damnation!" the single word "damnation!

Two of Mr. Ruskin's remarks on the Prayer Book service are recalled: He though the phrase "requisite and necessary" in the exhortation "a thor-ough piece of Cockney English" and that the petition in the prayer of St. Chrysostom that we may have "in this world knowledge of Thy truth, and in the world to come life everlasting," was, if I may use a slangy expression, rather a large order.


