

BEATTY PLEADS
FOR ARMS ACCORDays Every Instinct Binds U. S.
and Britain Together.

WELCOMED BY PILGRIMS

Bryce at London Also Urges
Similar Co-Operation.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—(Associated Press Dispatch.)—The possibility of any serious differences arising between Great Britain and the United States over the Washington conference on limitations of armament was discounted to-night by Admiral Beatty, first sea lord of the British admiralty, speaking at a dinner given in his honor by the Pilgrim Society.

The world will wait and watch with supreme interest the conference's deliberations, Admiral Beatty said, but nowhere will it be watched with more hope than in Britain. Surely, he added, here never was a great issue dependent upon the deliberations of men.

Reverting to the relationship between Britain and the United States and the part it will play in the conference, Admiral Beatty said the question was not one of bolstering up an "artificial and man-made alliance," but rather a question of keeping alive and awake the communion which is right and natural between the two nations.

"Our every instinct, our every instinct binds us together," he said.

BRYCE OPTIMISTIC.

LONDON, Oct. 27.—(Associated Press Cable.)—The century of perfect peace between the United States and Canada was cited as an example to the world by Viscount James Bryce, at a luncheon in his honor to-day by the English-speaking Union.

The disarmament agreement, affecting 3,000 miles of boundary between Canada and the United States, is an

arrangement which should be made world-wide, he said.

Viscount Bryce was formerly welcomed home after his recent lecture tour of the United States. He interpreted the recent presidential election in the United States as a non-acceptance of the Versailles treaty in its present form, but declared it did not mean aloofness and isolation on the part of the United States.

He urged the co-operation with the United States on the part of the British delegates to the Washington conference.

SENATE FOR BRIAND.

PARIS, Oct. 27.—The Senate gave Premier Briand a vote of confidence to-day, 201 to 9. The premier repeated in the Senate the declarations he made yesterday in the Chamber of Deputies.

During the course of his remarks he said: "Our United States friends have invited the whole world to confer with them on the difficult situation in the interest of world peace. I have thought that it was not an excessive tribute of gratitude on the part of France that the premier himself should go to Washington and express thanks to the people of the United States."

COMMUNISTS ATTEMPT
TO HOLD DEMONSTRATION
AT BASLE CONSULATE

BASLE, Switzerland, Oct. 28.—Several hundred Communists to-day attempted to hold a demonstration in front of the United States consulate here in protest against the conviction of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Venzetti in Massachusetts last summer. The police, however, quickly restored order and dispersed the would-be demonstrators.

INCORPORATIONS

KIND HEART LOST
BATTLE FOR KARLRefused To Order Bombardment
of Student Troops.

WAS SORRY FOR THEM

Moment of Delay Enabled Government
Troops To Act.

BUDAPEST, Oct. 28.—Former Emperor Charles is believed to have lost the chance to occupy the Hungarian throne because of his unwillingness to order the bombardment of positions held by university students who barred his path at Budaors for two hours last Sunday morning. Hungary's fate hung in the balance during that time, it is asserted here.

The students had entrenched themselves along a ridge of hills and received forces supporting Charles with a hot machine gun fire. Military leaders of Charles' expedition reported that the students' position must be bombarded, but Charles was loath to issue orders to this effect.

"I am sorry for the poor boys," he is quoted as saying. "Try to persuade them that resistance is hopeless." Parties began, but the machine gun fire was too much for them. They were hurried forward from Budapest and occupied the ridge held by the students. As a result it was found when Charles gave the order to attack that the battle was already lost.

MUST BE DELIVERED.

Dr. Edgite, 25.—Former Emperor Charles must be surrendered to the "Little Entente" within 36 hours, under the terms of an ultimatum from the members of this combination of states, which it has decided to present to the Hungarian Government in Budapest. Deputy Macoch declared at a mass meeting held here last night that the ultimatum would be presented some time to-day. The project of internment of the former emperor in either Czechoslovakia or Yugoslavia has been discussed freely by newspapers in this country. Foreign Minister Benes has been in communication with the allied nations as well as Rumania and Yugoslavia relative to the steps to be taken as the result of Charles' abortive attempt to regain the Magyar throne.

Prince Graetz, a Carlist leader, fled from West Hungary when Charles' coup failed, intending to go to Holland. He was, however, stopped by the Czechoslovak frontier. Leaders of the political parties forming the coalition ministry of this country have decided that the Government will introduce a bill in Parliament decreeing the confiscation of estates owned by Count Julius Andorssy, Deputy Rakovsky, and Count Albert Apponyi, located in Czechoslovakia.

MARTIAL LAW.

As a precautionary measure martial law has been proclaimed in the eastern districts of the country, although perfect order prevails. The mobilization of troops, which were called to the colors when Charles began his advance upon Budapest, was conducted smoothly. It is estimated by newspapers that the mobilization has thus far cost 800,000,000 kronen and that the cost will amount to 100,000,000 kronen per day as long as the men remain in the ranks.

A number of Magyar newspapers here

have been suspended, and their editors have been arrested, or their houses have been searched for evidence that they are implicated in the Karlist plot.

DIDN'T WANT CIVIL WAR.

BUDAPEST, Oct. 28.—Immaculately clad in the uniform of a Hungarian general, former Emperor Charles, as a prisoner in the hands of the people over whom he made an abortive attempt to re-establish sovereignty, to-day issued the following terse message through the Associated Press correspondent: "I was sure my people would offer resistance, so I gave orders to withdraw when the Government troops opened fire. Nothing can persuade me to provoke civil war. I trust Providence and the future will bring harmony between the Hungarian nation and its sovereign."

Charles and ex-Empress Zita were seen by the correspondent as they passed at the railway station of Szekesfeharvar, near the shores of Lake Balaton, on their way to Tibany Abbey from Esterhazy Castle, where the erstwhile royal pair were captured after last Sunday's battle.

Except for the military escort the ex-rulers gave no appearance of being prisoners. Charles looked fresh in his general's uniform, and the ex-empress was neatly clad in a plain gray dress. Prince Esterhazy, their host during their brief sojourn at Tata-Tovaros, was accompanying them to their new temporary residence.

HAYS WOULD HAVE
WEAPONS USEDOrders Rifles Sent To N. Y. Post
Office Unpacked.

SIFTING MAIL ROBBERY

Hopes To Recover Loot Before
It Is Disposed of.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—A consignment of firearms that lay unused in the New York post office, when automobile bandits held up and robbed a lone, unarmed mail truck driver of \$4,542.12 last Monday night, were out to-day doing duty on the persons of guards who accompanied similar treasure trucks through the city's streets.

One of the first things Postmaster General Hays discovered when he arrived yesterday to take charge of the investigation of the robbery, was that a large shipment of guns sent to arm New York postal employees after a series of mail robberies in other cities were in these shipping cases. He also ordered an investigation to determine who had been responsible for their shipment to the post office.

Post office inspectors, increased in number to 15 after Mr. Hays' arrival, were bending every energy to unravel the tangled mass of clues leading to the hold-up men, and recapture their rich haul before they could dispose of it. Aided by scores of city detectives, the inspectors were rapidly sifting the case down to its essentials.

SCRATCH IS STRONG.

The choice of Warden Eugene Scratch, as Government candidate in South Essex, has proven highly popular throughout the riding, and a meeting yesterday, at Essex, of party representatives, brought out statements from every municipality, including Pelee Island. Workers of former campaigns were out in strength, as well as several ex-members. The greatest enthusiasm was shown, and many expressed confidence that Mr. Scratch will have a fine majority on December 6.

There were rumors some time ago that Hon. George P. Graham, who has been in the field as Liberal candidate for a long time, was not going to face the battle, and quite recently Liberal leaders, under pressure from those who doubt the expediency of an outsider leading the South Essex forces, were understood to have reached a decision to ask the ex-minister to withdraw in favor of a local man. Within the past few days, however, Hon. Mr. Graham has issued a "manifesto," and flooded the riding with copies of it. It is assumed that the candidate felt it advisable to put before the electors something more satisfactory than the platform to which the Liberal party allowed itself to be tied in 1919.

MINISTERS TO SPEAK.

E. R. Senbrook, of London, Western Ontario organizer, who attended the Essex meeting, told the Free Press that arrangements have been made for Hon. L. G. Bell, postmaster-general in the Meighen cabinet, to address meetings in the riding at an early date, and that it is expected Hon. J. W. Edwards, minister of health and immigration, and Hon. H. G. Guthrie, minister of militia, will also visit the constituency.

In addition to Warden Scratch and Hon. G. P. Graham there is a third candidate in the field, the United Farmers having brought out W. T. Williams a few days ago. Mr. Williams was formerly an active Liberal.

Dr. J. W. Brien, of Essex, who represented the riding in the last Parliament, had a majority in 1917 of 168, as Government candidate. A. H. Clarke, Liberal, was successful at the three previous elections by 175, 200 and 250 votes respectively.

KHAKI TO REPLACE
FRENCH HORIZON BLUE
WHEN STOCKS DONE

PARIS, Oct. 28.—Horizon blue will be replaced by khaki as the color of the uniforms worn by French officers and soldiers under a decision reached by the superior war council yesterday. The uniforms of the French army will be in future similar in color to those of the Canadian army.

The order for the change in the uniform of the French army will not immediately come into effect, but will be operative when the present stocks of horizon blue cloth are exhausted. These stocks, it is said at the war ministry, are sufficient to last for 10 years.

HOLD-UP MAN CHARGED
WITH MURDER ATTEMPT

Albert Slade, Captured After Failure at
Montreal, Faces Court.

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—Albert Slade, arrested on Wednesday night in connection with the abortive hold-up in the bank of the Canadian Bank of Commerce here on Tuesday, was arraigned yesterday afternoon before Judge Cusson on a charge of attempted murder. It is alleged that Slade is the man who fired at Bank Teller I'vee Patrick O'Hara, identified as the man who was in the automobile that drove away from the bank with the hold-up men, was also arrested and charged with complicity.

Both men pleaded not guilty and were remanded to Bordeaux jail until Monday for preliminary hearing. Albert Slade was identified to-day as the "one bandit" who held up and robbed the bank of Hamilton, in Hamilton, last July. This was established by Eugene Lafamme, barrister expert here, who took his fingerprints, which corresponded with those of Norman Ryan, alias Norman J. Bell, as described in a circular in the hands of the officer. Chief Lepage stated last night he thought O'Hara would also be found to have been connected with the Hamilton bank robbery.

BUSINESS MEN TO HANDLE
UNEMPLOYMENT PROBLEM

TORONTO, Oct. 27.—Toronto business men are going to handle the unemployment situation during next winter. They are going to take the matter out of the hands of the municipal authorities so far as possible. This was decided upon at a meeting of the Federation of Toronto Business Men's Association last night.

On the suggestion of Major W. E. Harris a commission of prominent business men was appointed to deal with the situation. The aim of this commission will be to seek the co-operation of such bodies as the Rotary Club, the Kiwanis Club, the Board of Trade and the Canadian Manufacturers' Association in trying to secure suitable employment for every man in the city during the winter months.

GETS 20 YEARS FOR
STABBING AT A DANCE

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 28.—At Hopewell Cape, Albert County, yesterday, in the Supreme Court, Judge Barry presiding, Charles Brown, colored, was found guilty of unlawfully killing Victor Cahill at Pointe Wolfe, Albert County, a few weeks ago. Judge Barry sentenced Brown to 20 years in the penitentiary. Brown stabbed Cahill at a dance.

FRENCH GET OIL RIGHTS
IN CZECHO-SLOVAKIA

PRAGUE, Oct. 28.—Contracts giving the Standard Franco-American Oil Company, of Paris, exclusive rights in developing oil territory and in trading in petroleum products throughout the greater part of Czechoslovakia have been approved by the Cabinet. This firm is a subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company, of New Jersey.

Fifty districts of the country were excepted from the application of the concession given the company. In these districts concessions already have been given, or exploitation of oil lands by the state is going forward.
