Herbert Zinn, who was driving a wagon and team into which Brown lee's car crashed, repeated his story that he was on the wrong side of the road because has was passing a buggy. He also testified that he had no mar tingale on his harness to prevent the wagon tongue being forced up in the air. He said the occupant of the buggy did not stop and that he had not tried to find out who was driving it. 




