Drummer's Death Was Accidental

Petrolia, March 30.—At the inquest tonight into the death of Drummer Edward Kerr, a verdict was reached that death was accidental, due to a fall while in a friendly wrestle with Pte. Edwards. It had been suspected meningitis had caused the youth's death.

The story told by Pte. Edwards was that several of the young soldiers of the local Lambton unit were engaged in friendly scuffling on the sidewalk; that someone had shoved young Kerr against him, and he had clinched. Upon Drummer Kerr asking to be released, Edwards had let go. At the same time Kerr, gave a quick jerk, and the suddenness of the release dropped him to the walk upon his head. Edwards helped him to rise, and on being asked if he were hurt, Kerr replied that he had just hurt his head, and continued tussling with the boys for half an hour or more. Later in the evening he had entertained some of the boys with drum selections. The fall occurred at 7.30.

Dr. Mulligan, who performed the autopsy, said there was a bruise on the skull and a blood clot over the whole brain, also a small tear of the left hemisphere of the cerebellum. Death was due to hemorrhage. The delay in the result was natural, as the blood had to clot before the injury would take effect.
