A U.S. Army Corps in Canada.

Washington, Dec. 30.—Sir Julian Pauncefote, the British Ambassador, sent an official communication yesterday to the Secretary of State, announcing that the British Government will permit the detachment of the United States Army accompanying the Government relief expedition to cross British territory in making the trip. The detachment will be accompanied by a representative of the Canadian Government as an escort while passing over British soil.

CANADIAN CURRENCY.

Brantford's free postal delivery will be inaugurated in a few days.

One of the C.P.R. steamers on Kootenay Lake has been destroyed by fire.

Winnipeg is now the third postoffice in Canada in point of business, the order being Toronto, Montreal, Winnipeg.

The criminal charge against Dr. Hutchinson, of Ingersoll, has been dropped, owing to the marriage in that town of Augustus Fresselle and Lizzie Doohan, the other parties in the case.

Miss Susie Gallenath, a domestic, is suing David Smith, farmer, of East Luther, Dufferin County, for \$5,000 damages for injuries to her feelings for refusing to carry out his promise to marry her.

Three hundred and fifty prominent citizens of Collingwood voted unanimously at a public meeting in favor of granting the C.T.R. a \$25,000 bonus on the completion of new tracks in the town.

The 25th annual meeting and election of officers of the Commercial Travelers' Association of Canada was held in Toronto, Monday, M. P. 22, addressed the meeting on his Departmental Store Bill now before the House.

Mrs. Bruchol arrived at Montreal yesterday, and stated that he had not yet received the text of the Papal encyclical which has about reached Quebec, and will be read from the church Jan. 9. His Grace is in the best of health.

The murder case, which was adjudged from last week, was continued at Cobocook. No new evidence of importance was brought out. A Government detective has been investigating the case, but has failed to throw any light on the affair, and it will likely be dropped by consent of the prosecution.

A Battery men at Kingston have received \$50 from Richardson Bros. and \$50 from the General Hospital governors for aiding in snubbing fires. These amounts and \$50 realized last night at a concert have all been cheerfully turned over to the hospital governors to aid in rebuilding the wing recently destroyed by fire.

At the Eastern Ontario Poultry Show, now being held in Cornwall, over 1,000 birds are on exhibition, 300 having been shut out because they arrived too late.

One of the most attractive features is a display of dressed poultry, as prepared for the British market, prepared by Prof. Gilbert of the Ottawa Experimental Farm.

In a lonely portion of Rosedale last night an unknown man, about 20 years of age, 5 feet 6 inches in height, weight 120 pounds, of dark complexion, hair and mustache, the latter not very heavy, drooping somewhat.

Hypnotist Ferris Married.

Simcoe, Ont., Dec. 30.—Prof. Ferris, the hypnotist, was married here yesterday afternoon to Helen Bourque, one of Simcoe's fairest daughters. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. Prescott, in the Methodist church, and was witnessed by the best people in town. A reception was held at the home of the bride's parents.

The Cruelty of Robbers.

Onondaga, Dec. 30.—While John Clark of this place was at church Sunday evening last, he was snatched, man, entered the house and tied Mrs. Clark to the stair door. They then blew out the light, lighted a dark lantern and proceeded to search the house for valuables. They got about \$10 in money and some jewelry. They also took two gold rings off the fingers of Mrs. Clark, after which they put a towel around her neck, and, attaching the other end to the ceiling, they left her. By raising herself on tiptoe she managed to keep from choking to death. Her husband returned and took her down. The jewelry was found next morning. No arrests as yet.

Gladstone's Birthday Anniversary.

London, Dec. 30.—Yesterday being the birthday of the Right Hon. William E. Gladstone, the usual congratulations were sent to Hawarden and Cannes, where Mr. Gladstone is residing, though still suffering from neuralgia.

The Right Hon. William Ewart Gladstone was born Dec. 29, 1809.

Replying to a certain greeting, sent to him by the National Liberal Club, Mr. Gladstone said that his health has been greatly benefited by his stay at Cannes and that he hopes to be back soon again at Hawarden by the middle of February. He adds that Mrs. Gladstone's health has also improved.

Plague Returns in India.

Bombay, Dec. 30.—There has been a recrudescence of the plague, especially in the Malabar district, where the inhabitants are seeking safe havens in flight. There were 54 fresh cases of plague and 37 deaths from that disease yesterday. The total plague returns for Bombay up to date are 14,327, and 11,823 deaths.

France Makes a Grab.

Paris, Dec. 30.—The French, it is announced, have occupied Odienna and Samatragia. It is believed this indicates that an advance against Chief Samory is imminent.

Chief Samory is a West African chieftain, who for over 12 years past has been the most dangerous antagonist the Europeans have had to deal with. After ten years of guerrilla warfare, he was driven out of the Soudan, but he made a swoop upon the fertile region of Kong, a dependency of the French Ivory Coast. Since then Chief Samory has repeatedly been heard from.

UNITED STATES TELEGRAMS.

The Merchants and Traders' Bank of Brunswick, Georgia, has failed. The capital of the bank was \$100,000.

Colonel W. D. Hagar, who has been one of the managers of Barnum's show for many seasons, and is well known all over the country, died last night at Wauson, Ohio, aged 50 years.

Sir Julian Pauncefote, the British Ambassador at Washington, has about recovered from a long and painful attack of rheumatism, which has kept him in bed for a good part of the last three months.

Lawrence Walters, an aged farmer of Cass County, Mich., had no faith in the new and curious medicine, about \$5,000, in a hole under the barn. Yesterday he found that robbers had got away with his fortune, and he is almost crazy about it.
