

The number of communicants is very small, but, I am thankful to say, on the increase. The Sunday school is going on well, but the number of scholars is below what I have reason to expect. I record, with much satisfaction, the erection of a horse shed of six stalls, near the church. This is certainly a great gain. Though there is here in this station much more to be done and learned, I am thankful for the measure of encouragement vouchsafed, and the pledge of future blessing.

Windsor.—The church in this station is about four miles from Brompton Church, and is served every Sunday afternoon. I cannot say the congregation is not good, but some of the members are not so regular in their attendance as they might be. This may be owing to the church having been closed for a long time before my appointment. But I am glad to say there are signs of improvement in this as in other respects. The communicants are very few. I must mention that we are here burdened with a debt on the church land and building. Efforts are being made to discharge the obligation. Subscriptions have been promised, but I regret not being able to report the clearing off of the debt by the beginning of the new year, when we hope to resume our former contribution to the Diocesan Board. This mission station is very poor, and, in the eyes of the world, probably too poor to be worth the Church's attention. Fortunately, the Church sees differently, and we may, if, by God's help, we work steadily, quietly and confidently, anticipate rich results.

My financial statement looks poor, but is not so poor as it looks. The offerings have been willingly made, and may be taken as an earnest of greater things to come.
