

British Postmaster - General Will Include Toronto in His Tour of Dominion.

LONDON, Aug. 22. — (C.A.P.) — Herbert Sawuel, postmaster-general, who sailed on the Empress of Britain yesterday for Canada, tho declining to disclose the nature of the business awaiting discussion between himself and Postmaster-General Pelletier, admitted that he hoped among other things to effect some improvement in the existing postal arrangements between the two countries. After a few days in New Brunswick, Mr. Samuel will proceed to Quebec, where Mr. Pelletier will meet him and accompany him westward. Included in his western itinerary are Winnipelg, Vancouver, Victoria, Edmonton, Calgary, Regina and Banff. He will return thru the United States, calling one or two days at Chicago, and afterwards return to Canada, where he will devote about ten days to Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal.

FAMILY'S NARROW ESCAPE FROM FIRE

KINGSTON, Aug. 22.—(Special.)— Hiram Day, a Kingston cheese mak-er, his wife and two little children, came within an ace of being burned to death last night, when the Model Cheese Factory at Inverary caught fire and was burned to the ground. All four were sound asleep when the fire started from the engineroom. The Day family like in quarters adjoining fire started from the engineroom. The Day family live in quarters adjoining the factory, and when Mr. Day awoke, he found the entire place in flames. They had no time to drezs, but escaped in night clothes. Mr. Day dropped out of the upstair window to the ground and Mrs. Day threw the children into his arms and then climbed out of the window herself, and was caught in her husband's arms. All escaped injury. The factory was valued at \$3,000 and was insured for \$2,000. Sixty boxes of cheese were destroyed on which there was insurance. Lieutenant Col. Frederick Ferguson and T. Thicken slightly with four and add evaporated milk to color nicely. NATIONAL CHORUS REHEARSALS SOON

Dr. Ham Has Selected Exact- Eddie Ward and Tom McDon ing Program for Next Season's Concert.

The National Chorus of Toronto will begin rehearsals for the season of 1913-14 as soon as the Exhibition rush is over. Dr. Albert Ham, who returned from Aigonquin Park this week, has prepare a program of unusual merit for the eleventh annual concert, and in addition the chorus will have the honor of the assistance of Mmg.Marte Rappold, the famous soprano of the Metropolitan Opera, and Miss Vera Barstow, the rising young violinist, each of whom will make her initial appearance with this organization. The choral program indicates that selections have been made with a catholicity of taste that will make a strong appeal to all music lovers. The Russian (modern) a capella style is represented by two splendid specimens, in the "Cherubim Song" by Gluika, and "Sunrise," by Taneyeff, each in six parts. Both are full of warmth and vigor, and only so carefully trained a chorus coould hope to give them a proper interpretation. There are also on the program two fine examples of the English madrigal, "Come, Let Us Join the Roundelay," by Beale, an old composer, and "Flora's Queen," for double chorus, by Sir John Stainer. The American composer, MacDowell, will have two numbers to his credit—one, a charming Barcarolle for full chorus, and "Summer Wind," a four-part song for ladles' voices, unaccompanied. Mme. Rappold will take the soprano solo in Max Bruch's beautiful setting of "Jubilate, Amen," and both she and the chorus will have an opportunity to distinguish thepiselves. Dr. Ham has decided to repeat the "Ballade of Spring," sung with great success three seasons ago, and the choral rhapsody, "Seadrift," that pleased Toronto and Buffalo so greatly last winter. THAW'S LAWYERS

Decision of French Court Following Hague Decision May Have Bearing.

MARSEILLES, Aug. 22.—(Can. Press).

-The decision of The Hague tribunal in the case of the Hindu, Savarkar, which upheld the British contention that despite the prisoner's escape and recapture on French soil, it was not a matter of French jurisdiction, was successfuly quoted by the prosecutor at the court martial here today of a French soldier named Vogel, charged with asaulting his superior officers and with desertion.

The court held that The Hague decision disposed of the legality of Vogel's arrest and he was sentenced to ten years in prison.


