THE BY-ELECTIONS

North Lanark Conservatives Will Choose Their Can- didate Next Thursday.

OTTAWA, Aug. 22.—(Special).—The
approaching by-election in North Lanark
has caused the Conservative Party to
hold a special meeting on Thursday
next, at which time they will choose
their candidate for the constituency.

Col. James Balderson, ex-mayor of Perth, and a former maw partner of the late provincial treasurer, Col. Mathe-
son, will again seek the nomination. He
has only two votes behind the late

Mr. Gilroy of Smith's Falls and Dr. Hanna of Perth are the other aspirants. It is understood the Liberals will not put up a candidate.

Hon. Arthur Meighen, solicitor-general, is expected to arrive next week and take over his official duties in the justice department.

FAMILY'S NARROW ESCAPE FROM FIRE

Hiram Day and His Wife
and Children Have to Jump

From Bedroom Window.

KINGSTON, Aug. 22.—(Special).—Hiram Day, a Kingston cheese maker, his wife and two little children, came within an ace of being burned to death last night, when the Model Cheese Factory at Iwawong,

**TRIED TO SWIM
AROUND ISLAND**

Eddie Ward and Tom McDonald Made Plucky Attempt

Yesterday.
CURRENT TOO STRONG

**Life-Savers, However, Will
Make Another Effort
to Succeed.**

What is considered a remarkable swimming feat for fresh water swimming, was accomplished yesterday afternoon when Eddie Ward and Tom McDonald, two members of the M. S. C. crew, tried to swim

The two life savers failed in their attempt yesterday, no doubt on account of the choppy nature of the lake, but

at the same time, they gave a good account of themselves when they weathered the choppy sea in the bay from the north end of the eastern cape to the inside end of the western cape before they gave in. The distance

between these two points is three and one half miles and the time taken for the swim was two hours and forty-five minutes.

This is the first time anyone has attempted to swim around the Iai and since the Indians lived here in 1492.

PROTEST AGAINST FORTIFIED CANAL

American Delegate at Peace Conference Speaks for Two Million American Women.

THE HAGUE, Aug. 22. — (Can. Press).—"Two millions of women in America protest against the fortification of the Panama Canal" was the assertion made today at the fourth plenary sitting of the twentieth universal peace congress by Mrs. May Wright Sewall, an Indianist.

In this remark which drew a round of applause from the pacifists assembled in the Knights' Hall, the speaker added: "The canal ought to be free for the whole world and should be adorned with a statue of peace at its entrance."

Encourage; with the good-will with which Mrs. Sewell's sentiments were greeted, Dr. William F. Slocum of Colorado Springs, a member of the Carnegie Foundation for the advancement of teaching, asked the congress to pass a resolution inviting the United States Government never to
