"ky the dovernor General, who, in proroguing the House had acterl upon advice from "persons not at all qualifisd to give it.
"The meeting then adjourned till $7 o^{\prime}$ clock.
"In the ovening a very large and most enthusiastic meting of Members and others
"was held in the Railway Committee Roont, under the presidency of Mr. Mackenzio.
"The room was orowded to its utmost eapacity, and the feeling manifestod was that of
" the deepest indignation against the Ministry, who had trampled on the Constitutional
"rights of the people. The Governor-General was also spokon of as having overstretched
"the Royal prerogative, which, instiand of being exercised to shield the Ministry from
"enquiry, should have been used to hasten and second the proper conduce of an enquiry.
"It was moved by Mr. Cauchon, seconded by Mr. Mills, and resolved:
" 'That, in the opinion of this mesting, the prorogation of Parliament without " giving the Honse of Commons tho opportunity of prosecuting the enquiry which it
" 'had undertaken, is a gross violation of the privileges and independence of Par-
" 'liament, and of the rights of the people.
"Moved by Dr. L'orbes, seconded by Mr. Curturight, and
"Resolved- That, in the opinion of this meoting, the House of Commons is the " 'proper body to institute and prosecute an enquiry into the pending charges against
"'Ministers; and that the action of the accused Ministers, in removing the enquiry
"' fiom the Commons, and appointing a Commission under their own control to try
"' themselves, is a gross violation of the rights, privileges and independence of Par-
" 'liament ; and it will be the imperative duty of the House of Commons, at the earliest
" ' moment at which it is allowed to meet, to take action for the vindication of their
"' rights ; and for the resumption of a Parliamentary enquiry.'
"Eloquent and stirring addresses were delivered by Messis. Cau./hon, Mills, Forbes, "Caviluright, Hon. A. J. Smith, Isaac Rurpee, McDonaht (Inverness), Cunningham, "Cofin, Goudge (Hants), Fiset, Senators Lelellier de St. Just, Christic, Rymal, Hun. John "Young, Jetté, Anglin, and Mackenzie.
"The meeting broke up about 10.30 p.m.
"Although many gentlemen who had previously been indentified with the Govern" ment were present, not one of them expressed dissatisfaction with the proceedings, of "in any way indicated their dissent. Euch Member proposed to bring the natter before " his constituents at the earliest possible moment, and there is little doubt that there will "be a tremondous agitation throughout the length and breadth of Canada;"
