In the compilation of this modern edition the services of 1500 of the leading minds in science, arts and practical scholarship were engaged, involving an initial outlay of upwards of \$1,150,000 before one volume was produced. The ployment of India paper has reduced the bulk until it is like unto an Oxford Bible. The display in Tyrrell's store serves to graphically illustrate the strides that have been made in modern, publishing methods.
