The candidates whose marks entitle them to standing under the regulations relating to persons engaged in mercantile or industrial occupations should forward their statements, together with their certificates of employment, to the secretary of the University matriculation board, Department of Education, Toronto.

### STUDENTS READY FOR GOOD WORK

Forty Per Cent. of Those in the High School Night Classes Can Start Senior Matriculation.

At the management committee of the board of education yesterday afternoon Dr. Embree reported that 40 per cent of the night class students at the high schools were ready to start senior matriculation work.

The subcommittee reported in favor of placing Col. Thompson director of all the cadet companies, high and public schools. The report was referred back for a conference with the high school principals who object to the proposal.

J. C. Atkinson of the boys' Dominion movement explained that the staff of teachers required for these classes at the George Street School would have to cover about a dozen departments. The committee agreed to make the necessary appointments.

Additional teachers will also be appointed to Oakwood High School. John Jeffrey and D. A. Glassey were added to the Harbor Collegiate night class staff.

Dr. Embree was appointed supervisor of high school night classes.

### PROGRESSIVE NAME KNOX SMITH.

HARTFORD, Conn., Sept. 26.—(Can. Press.)—Herbert Knox Smith of Farmington was nominated for governor by the Progressive state convention here today. The nomination was by acclamation.

Mr. Smith resigned a few weeks ago his position as commissioner of corporations at Washington to aid the Roosevelt campaign.

ORGANIZATION.—The company was organized in 1909, and acquired the patent rights of the Noiseless Typewriter for the United States, Canada, Mexico, and the Argentine Republic. The company took possession of its factory at Middletown, Connecticut, and started into production November, 1910. In December, 1910, it began to market its product. 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### REGULARS SNUB BULL MOOSERS

SARATOGA, N.Y., Sept. 26.—(Can. Press.)—The platform presented to the Republican State Convention tonight praised the administration of President Taft and arraigned the Democrats, but practically ignores the Progressive party and its national and state candidates. In this omission delegates said they traced the influence of U. S. Senator Root.

The platform mentions the Progressive party but twice: once to denounce the proposal to choose judges "because of their known views on matters likely to come before them," and again in the preamble, which says: "A vote for the Democratic presidential nominee endangers national prosperity, a vote for
