For the most part there has been good moisture in this province, but on the report of general conditions, the average outlook is very fair on condition that we get more rain.

In Saskatchewan it has been ne cessary to reseed about five per cent. of the crop area, and the number of points reporting wheat in shot blade nuch smaller than in Manitoba. Evidently the need of moisture is great and many report that hot winds are still doing damage. On the whole the crop is later than last year.
