

ROY GRATTAN WINS PACE AT CLEVELAND

Defeating Ouc and Sarando That Made Remarkable Time in Second Heat.

Cleveland, O., Aug. 4.—Attracted by two sweepstakes, a large crowd braved the threatening weather for the opening of the second grand circuit meeting at the North Randall field today. Owing to showers through the morning, the track was heavy, but some fast time was made. All of the favorites won.

The North Randall purse of \$1,100, for two-year-olds, was won by the heavily favored Royal Mac. He took the first heat easily, but had to stand a hard drive in the second heat. Wilkes Brewer took the second heat.

The Great, which has never lost a heat, led from the start to finish and easily won the News' \$1,000 stakes, for two-year-olds trotting. The fly shot in \$100 in the auction pool against \$30 for the field.

The 200 pace resulted in the hottest contested event of the day, four heats being necessary to decide the winner. Sarando took the second heat in 2:02 1/2, the fastest mile of the day, considered remarkable owing to the condition of the track. He did the half-mile in 1:01. Roy Grattan won the first and fourth heats and the race, with the third heat going to Ouc in a hard drive.

Tommy Dodd, the veteran half-mile runner, secured the 210 after finishing a poor fourth to Theace, a long shot, in the first heat. MONTREAL TRACKS ALLREADY TO OPEN

With Delormier First, Week From Saturday, According to Announcement.

Montreal, Aug. 4.—Preparations are in full swing at the independent race tracks today for the resumption of racing. Edward decided to hold races at four tracks, at a meeting of owners held on Saturday. The pari-mutuel system of betting will be used.

The racing depends largely upon the ability of the tracks to secure horses, and emissaries from the Montreal independent circuit are today scouting through Quebec, where owners, from Baltimore to Saratoga, are arranging for shipments. There are fifty or sixty horses quartered now at the various Montreal tracks, but with scores of owners across the line unable to place their horses, no difficulty in getting thoroughbred here is looked for.

The tracks will run in the following order: Delormier, King Edward, Mount Royal and a mile track. Delormier is the track where Wilkes Brewer is at present, as a result of having been kept in shape since spring, and the plant was recently overhauled and put in first-class condition. Work was started today on Mount Royal and the King Edward, it is said, is in excellent condition.

The track owners at their meeting decided to give the preference in the matter of employment to returned soldiers, following the example of the Australian race tracks, where those who were injured soldiers, returning from the front, frequently crippled, have been provided with lucrative employment, often at far better salaries than the could, in the ordinary way, command.

The tracks will run in the following order: Delormier, August 16 to 23; King Edward, August 25 to September 1; Mount Royal, September 2 to September 9. It is likely that a mile track will fill in for the fourth week. The second series will start at Delormier on September 17, and the tracks will run in the same order as before.

First class sport, ideal weather and a good attendance made an all round success of the first day of the Grand Army of Canada Athletic Association at Scarborough Beach Park yesterday. The sporting events were as varied as they were interesting and the spectators had not a dull moment. When there was nothing to attract in the field, the excellent Grand Army Band was discoursing good music, or pleasant personal reunions were being held. Mayor Church was there all the time and at the close distributed the prizes in his customary genial manner, having an appropriate word or two ready for each recipient.

The big event of the day was the 100 yards invitation handicap race for the H. A. Wills handsome trophy, which, after a light and exciting race, in which noses almost counted with the tape, A. L. Ponton was returned the victor, with Green and Chisholm close at his heels. In the 100 yards handicap race for boys 12-year-old, Jack Wareham scored a popular, if unexpected, win, as he came in for quite an ovation. The open 100 yards race proved a great race, in which three scratch men of the heats were first, second and third, the first three being the victor in the handicap.

The 400 yards handicap was rendered notable by the fact that the race was won by B. Swayne, the limit man, who is 49 years of age. The "old man" as he was greeted by the crowd—albeit he can still get most of the younger ones a licking—got a great reception. The mile bicycle race was interesting. When near home McDonald had a fair lead over Kuebens and Watson coming up. The latter pair had the misfortune to collide, machines and men getting mixed up. Happily no harm was done. The men soon re-mounted and were able to occupy second and third places. A good field. Scholes, the scratch man, was obviously a big favorite, and as one time looked like winning. He was, however, bowled by Leighton, who landed the spoils.
