WANT PEACEFUL SOLUTION OF POLITICAL PROBLEMS

New Party Launched at Moscow to Secure Co-Operation of the Moderates.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 10.—The healthiest symptoms of the situation are the efforts now being made at Moscow by the new party of pacific regeneration, ex-Octoberists, to secure the active co-operation of the moderate-minded Constitutional Democrats and unite the progressive elements of society which do not believe in a violent revolution, and to defeat the candidates of the extremists of all parties at the coming elections.

Should the negotiations be successful, it is the intention to issue an appeal to the country, asking all who favor a peaceful solution of the political, economic and ethical problems to sink individual differences, unite and compel the government to realize the aspirations for a constitutional regime, and at the same time save the country from a violent revolution and anarchy. It is the intention to call a convention and begin an active electoral campaign.

Traced to Flying Fighters. The attempts on the lives of Vice-Admiral Doubagoff, ex-governor-General of Moscow, and of General Napuloff, commander of the Sebastopol Fortress, have been traced to the "flying" organization of the social revolutionists. Doubagoff's assailant, who was killed by the explosion of his own bomb, has now been positively identified. GOES AGAINST RAILWAY CAN'T OUST THE LESSEES

Decision of Justice MacMahon Allows A. R. Williams Co. to Remain.

The A. R. Williams Company will not be compelled to vacate their premises at York and Front-streets, as required by the Grand Trunk; at least, not for the present.

Justice MacMahon, in giving judgment on the action of the railway to force the company to vacate within thirty days, said that under the section of the act relating to the expropriation of land by a railway, it is set forth that such land must be required "forthwith." As the railway did not appear to be going ahead with its new Union Station plans at present, the suit was accordingly dismissed, with permission to renew it when evidence can be shown of the beginning of actual operations.

Fleming for Controller. It may seem a little early as yet for prospective candidates to be giving serious thought to the municipal elections of 1907, but there is the possibility about taking time by the forelock, in which Ald. Fleming is an evident believer.

From now on, I'm for the board of control," was the announcement made by the general chairman of the fire and light committee yesterday. Ald. Fleming has not made up his mind to take the leap on brief municipal experience. For five years he has represented ward one, and has been chairman of an important committee he has shown initiative, particularly in the efforts he has put forward to improve the efficiency of the fire department.

Ald. Fleming is confident that his record in council entitles him to a seat among the "big four." He will depend on strong support, of course, in the east end, but at the same time is hopeful of making a good showing.

To Build in Rear. The chief issue before the fire and light committee yesterday arose out of the application of M. A. and G. R. Harris for permission to build a brick house in the rear of 61 Elm Grove-avenue, Parkdale.

Chief Thompson was sympathetically inclined, pointing out that the lot was a deep one, 478 feet, and that there were no houses on the adjoining property. Ald. McBride and Hay stoutly resisted on the general principle that houses should not be erected in the rear of others. Residents of the locality will be asked to give opinions.

Ald. McBride came into collision with the chief over the latter's report against giving a permit to one Patrick Maher, to install a shoeing forge in his stable on Hayden-street. Ald. McBride protested, whereupon the chief hinted darkly that the alderman's attitude on such matters was affected by private considerations. A. McBride selected in kind. The permit was refused.

Replaces Old Ralls. The city's grievance of many months against the street railway on the west-end Street Railway rails on King and Queen-streets, is to be taken up by City Engineer Rust immediately on his return from Grand Monday next. The mayor, on leaving for Halifax yesterday, left instructions to that effect.

The city solicitor's office is now in a devil strip where it is found necessary to reconstruct the foundation. It is stated that the company would be willing to sell the rails on the city's agreeing to build new roadbeds.

To Appeal "Stops" Decision. The Street Railway have notified the city that they will appeal the judgment of the court of appeal, whereby the company must accept the schedule of stops proposed by the city engineer. The city solicitor's advice is that a motion will be made before the court of appeal to-day to obtain a writ to go to the city council. The company is prepared to make the required affidavit that at least \$4000 is involved.

New Theatre. A permit for the building of the new Royal Alexandra Theatre on the old U.C.C. property, on the north side of King-street, west of Spadina-street, was granted yesterday. The structure will cost \$120,000.

Neff, former auditor of Erie county, convicted recently at Warsaw of grand larceny in connection with the alleged cemetery-armory scandal at Buffalo. Neff was fined at \$15,000.

Russia to Build Warships. London, Aug. 10.—The Evening Standard to-day announced that enterprises were being made in behalf of the Russian Government, among British shipbuilders, with reference to the construction of battleships.
