The company did not try to operate its street railway to-day, but will make another attempt Thursday afternoon.

C. K. Green entirely repudiates an alleged interview credited to him to the effect that the company would fight the union to a finish, and Mayor Biggar has received the assurance of J. M. Gibson that the sentiments expressed in the interview were not his.

"I am in favor of unions, and my record in the legislature proves that," is what Mr. Gibson said to the mayor.

The mayor will continue his efforts to bring about a settlement and at eleven o'clock Thursday morning will continue the conference with the executive of the union, and A. B. Ingram of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Beard. He has not given up hope yet of bringing about peace.
