college second to none in America. If he had the original \$400,000 that was spent he would erect a much better college than the present one, and he would have the same amount of improvements in college buildings since then. There are now 100 boys at the college who are spending about \$200 per annum each, and he hoped within five years to see 200 there, spending double the present amount each year. This must necessarily be most beneficial to the business of Toronto. The private citizens of Montreal had contributed largely to the support of educational institutions, and he thought the citizens of Toronto should be as liberal as those of other cities, even if only as a matter of business. City like Toronto should have the best school in the country. He believed that there would be necessity for a school of this description in Canada, where pupils could find a home as well as a school. If the college could not be put on a safe financial footing he was afraid the doors would have to be closed as suggested by the Minister of Education, but if he could obtain the assistance he wanted, the college would be able to keep it open. He was assured that if the college could not be maintained in Toronto, it would be built in Montreal or other cities to build up a first-class college if it failed here.
