IMPROVING THE LINE.

G.T.R. sectionmen working at
Haydonville on Lake Ontario.
Whitby, July 26.—(Special.)—A big gang
of Northern Division sectionmen from Lin-
coln and other places north commenced
work this morning upon improvements to the

GRAFTING A NEW SCALP.

She was so badly injured that the attending
physicians were surprised to see her gain
strength gradually, and her scalp be-
gan to grow again. She was placed under the influence of ether
and the doctors began the tedious work
of grafting skin on the head. The doctors
feel certain that if the bone beneath the
scalp does not die, the grafting will be
a success. They believe that the inner
portion of bone will supply the upper part
with sufficient nourishment.

HIS LIFE WORK DESTROYED.

New York, July 26.—Dr. R. Johnson held,
a specialist in diseases of the eye and
ear, yesterday morning wrote the last of
5500 pages of a medical work which was to
be submitted to a publisher within a week,
and, much fatigued, the author sat down
in his arm chair and lighted his pipe. His
manuscript lying on the table beside him,
falling asleep, sparks from the pipe set
fire to the tablecloth, and when he awoke
his life's work was consumed.

CHILL MAY NOT TAKE PART.

Washington, July 26.—Chill persists in
his threat not to take part in the Pan-Am-
erican Congress in Mexico in October, un-
less the discussion of arbitration of inter-
national disputes is limited to contro-
versies arising in the future. The State
Department is anxious to leave the ques-

KING ALFRED THE GREAT.

Colonists Invited to Join in a
Grand Commemorative Event.
A splendid statue of King Alfred the
Great, the originator of the English navy,

to mark the 1000th anniversary of the

approved the proposal, and the King has

of Argyll, the Duke of Devon, the Mar-
quis of Salisbury, the Hon. John Hay, the
Marquis of Dufferin and Ava, Lord Reay,
the Earl of Aberdeen, the Bishops of
London, Winchester, the following: Earl
Roberts, the Chief Rabbi, Dr. Joseph Par-
ker, Mr. Rudyard Kipling, the Right Hon.
A. J. Balfour, Sir Henry Irving, the Lord
Chief Justice, Lord Lister, Lord Strath-
cona, Cardinal Vaughan, Mr. Frederick
Harrison, Lord Tennyson and others.

A meeting of learned societies will be
held in Winchester at the time of com-
memoration, and visits will be made to
the many places and buildings of interest
there. Besides the universities of Eng-
land and America, the following are repre-
senting the colonies, have been invited to
send delegates to attend the meeting: The
Universities of Cape of Good Hope, Ade-
laide, Melbourne, Sydney, Tasmania, New
Zealand (Australia), Acadia, Bishop's Col-
lege, the University of the Pacific, Victoria,
Manitoba, McGill, McMaster, Mount Alli-
son, New Brunswick, Ottawa, Queen's
University, Trinity, Victoria (Canada), Alia-
hahad, Bombay, Calcutta, Madras, Pun-
jab, (India).

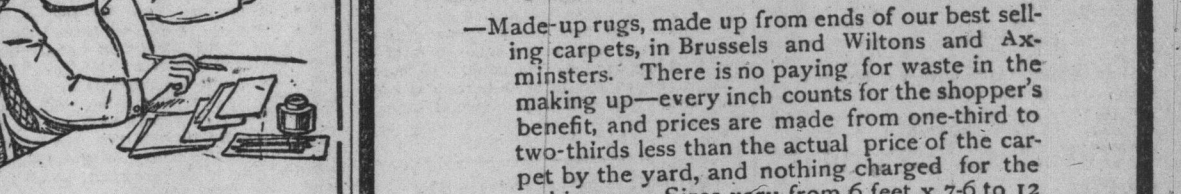

ONLY DOUBLED ANNUAL FEE.

Orange Mutual Benefit Fund Will
Not Increase Assessment.

The Orange Mutual Benefit Fund has
not increased the assessment for
yesterday. Thomas A. Duff, general agent
for Canada, says that the fund is prosper-
ing to such an extent that it has increas-
ed its insurance by 45 per cent. in the
last two and a half years. No suggestion
was offered at the Grand Lodge to in-
crease the assessment.

"All our insurance we have never
taken one dollar of an assessment for
fund expenses, for each insured member
must contribute a year towards ex-
penses," said Mr. Duff. "As we are now
taking some active measures to increase
the membership, extra expenses are neces-
sary, and to that end the annual fee has
been increased from \$1 to \$2. Thus it is
only the annual fee that has been
doubled, and the assessment remains as it
was. To ensure greater safety, the fund
has decided to pay examining physicians
\$2 for their fee, instead of \$1 as heretofore."

"Hon. Charles Wallace is president of the
fund, Dr. Wallace Nesbitt is chairman,
and Dr. John Noble is medical referee,
and they and the members of the executive
have never charged the order one cent
for their services," concluded Mr. Duff.
