

The various lines of arrows indicate the advance of the Japanese forces on Liaoyang and Mukden. The movements of the first army, under Gen. Kuroki, from Klulien-cheng, thru Fengwangcheng, to the Motien Pass, where it turned aside, ilanking the pass on both sides, are shown in the middle of the map. On the right the direction of the arrows in double lines, following known roads, indicates the probable advance of the Mysterious Army, of which so little is known, but which is believed now to threaten Mukden. It has been heard of at Kwantien and Sanatsi. On the left of the arrows pointing out Kuroki's advance is shown the route of the second army from Takushan, thru Siuyen, towards Haicheng, on the railway to Liaoyang and Mukden. On the extreme left is marked the latest development—the advance of a new army, not yet specifically named, from Kaichau, near Newchwatg, towards Haicheng, Liaoyang and Mukden. The thin black lines indicate the roads, while the railway on the left is plainly shown.


