The disease obtained headway through the attendance at school of children belonging to afflicted families, and rapidly went through three of the school rooms. She had been suffering from ill-health for some months past. Shortly after her arrival at her friends, she began to show evidences of an unbalanced mind. She subsequently became violent, and was taken to Woodstock jail, where she is now awaiting removal to an asylum.

Dr. McEachran, chief veterinary inspector for the Dominion, says the inspectors are getting every assistance from the farmers of Essex in their efforts to stamp out hog cholera. He expects the quarantine to be lifted within 30 days.

David Carley, P. H. Craig, A. M. Stewart, A. H. Clarke, Robert McDonald, Thomas Robinson, and J. E. d'Avignon will go to Saratoga, N. Y., Thanksgiving Day as the deputation from the Windsor preceptory of the Knights Templar.

While filling in the abutments of the Catfish bridge, near Sparta, on Thursday last, John Shaw, John Alexander, George Smith and D. E. Zennaro, of Sparta, were badly poisoned by coming in contact with poisonous weeds. They are all reported to be doing nicely.

Mrs. Well, of Stratford, was cleaning coaches in the G. T. R. yards on Monday afternoon, when a yard engine shunted against the car she was on, knocking her from a standing position on one of the seats to the floor. The result was three broken ribs.

The Aylmer Furnishing Company is trying in the Court of Appeal at Toronto to recover the \$5,000 worth of machinery in their factory at Aylmer, which was seized by the town under a bonus bylaw. The town claims the machinery was an immovable fixture, with the factory.

The funeral of August Parent, the Grand Trunk brakeman who was killed in two by the cars, took place Monday morning from St. Alphonsus' Church, Windsor. It was attended by all the railway men in town, and by about 30 uniformed Knights of St. John, of which order deceased was a member.

Word has been received at Goderich from Rossland, B. C., of the sudden death of Albert Pitt, son of Thos. Pitt, proprietor of the British Exchange Hotel. The young man left a few weeks ago to seek his fortune in the mines. This is the second son of Mr. Pitt has lost within a year.

Abell, the well-known apple buyer, at present in England; Wm. T. of Omaha, Neb., and Bert and Charles at home. The girls are Miss Rose Abell, at home, and Mrs. R. A. Webster, of East Zorra.

Mrs. McIntyre, wife of R. G. McIntyre, carpenter, Chatham, died at St. Joseph's Hospital there on Wednesday. Mrs. McIntyre had been a great sufferer for a long time, and as her malady became worse the only hope of prolonging her life was to perform an operation. On Monday the operation was performed, but her condition was already so weakened she could not recover, and passed away as stated.

The special committee of Chatham Council have presented a report on the proposal to sink a city well for gas, \$2,000 to be expended, of which one-half would be provided by the city. The report was favorably received by the council, but action deferred, pending discussion by the Board of Trade. The citizens are very anxious that the project be at once taken up and pushed to completion.

PORK PACKING.
A deputation of pork packers appeared, and Mr. Andrew Park read a statement, which asserted that the business had increased 50 per cent in the last 15 years. The higher tariff was alleged to be the reason for the development. The raising of hogs was regarded as a necessity to the profitable carrying on of the cheese and butter factories, while a large quantity of coarse grain is also used by the hogs. The trade, it was contended, gives employment to a large number of men in an immense variety of ways. The pork packers have a specific "protection," which amounts to 65 per cent, and they ask that it be not reduced.

WANT TAX TAKEN OFF.
D. McIntosh & Sons asked that any granite for purposes of manufacture be relieved of the present 20 per cent. The firm buy in Vermont and Massachusetts, as the Canadian granites contain flaws.

A SETTLED POLICY NEEDED.

Evidence in the Sternman Extradition Proceedings All In.
Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 19.—Nothing of importance was brought out by either side yesterday in the case of Mrs. Sternman.

Benjamin J. Morningstar, agent in this city for the Chautauque Loan Association, of Jamestown, N. Y., testified that he had a conversation with Sternman in May last in regard to buying stock in the Chautauque Association. He said that Sternman declined, saying that he could not afford it, as he was paying considerable money out for his own life insurance.

Chas. R. Roberts, special agent of the Metropolitan Insurance Company, of New York, was called. A close examination by Mr. Thayer brought out the fact that Roberts had been sent by the insurance company to Cayuga, Ont., to ascertain the cause of Sternman's death. Roberts said he was present at the inquest held at Cayuga, but was not responsible in any way for the arrest of Mrs. Sternman.

The jury returned a verdict of guilty, and recommended that the case so far as evidence was concerned. Next Tuesday was the day set for the lawyers to sum up.

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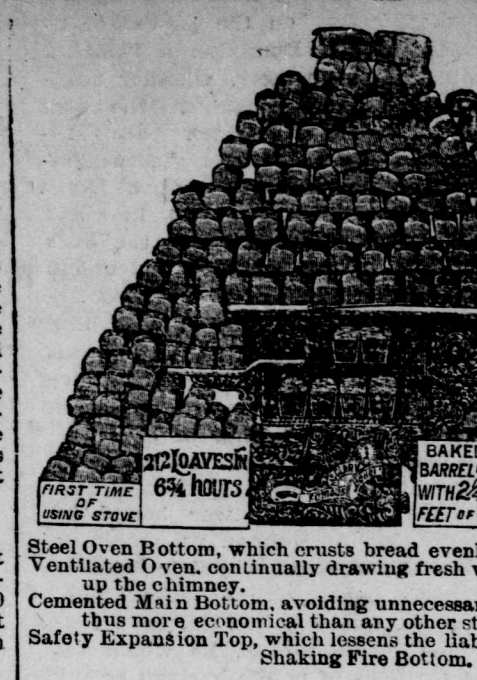
