One of them was to ask the government for power to elect aldermen by general vote. In this connection, an amendment by Ald. Graham to Ald. Parnell's original motion was passed. It recommended that the section of the act providing for the election of aldermen by general vote in cities of 10,000 to 15,000 of a population be made a plicable to cities having a populatio. of from 15,000 to 100,000, except that there shall be one alderman for every 4,000 of a population, instead of one for ev-

Ald. O'Meara opposed the motion. He had yet to be shown that the new system would elect more honest man than

able in accordance with the assessment ed. act of the province, and to make the civil servants liable for the payment of taxes thereon in like manner to

other citizens. It was also decided to petition to amend the assessment act, by providing that it shall hot be necessary to assess the real property of street railway, telephone, telegraph, gas and electric light companies by wards, but to make the total assessment in one ward. The gov- Managers' Report-Mr. James Meek, ernment will be asked further to provide better means of enabling assessors to ascertain the property which is liable to taxation, and the persons who shall be assessed for the same.

No action will be recommended on the resolution to petition the legis-lature to empower civic municipalities to levy rates upon lands benefited by the construction of storm sewers, and which do not front on streets along which the storm sewers are constructed.
