

Detroit Again Shut Out By the Athletics; Row Follows Giants' Defeat By the Cubs



The location of the proposed new athletic park, while considered slightly out of the way by some, is practically the only available spot for such a purpose about the city. The Canadian Club sports committee has appointed a delegation of four to receive estimates for fitting up the place in proper shape, and to attend to other business matters in connection with the affair. All that now remains to make the park a reality is the permission of the city fathers to use the site. It has been intimated that no opposition will be encountered on that score. Londoners have long felt the necessity of such a park, and to say that it will fill a long-felt want would be placing it mildly. With races, baseball, and the fair at Queen's Park, that place is almost out of the question as a site for athletic meets, and outside of Tecumseh Park, which is leased by the year to the City Baseball League, there is no athletic park in the city. The committee, which is composed of Messrs. Buttery, S. F. Glass, R. Carrothers, and Dr. J. D. Wilson, will wait upon the city council at its next meeting.

The athletic programme arranged for on the morning of May 24 provides for the Y. M. C. A. races at 9 a.m., ball game at Tecumseh Park at 10:30, between the Perrins and McClarys, and a game at the same hour at Queen's Park between the Ramblers and Somervilles. In the afternoon the Rockets and Stars cross bats at Tecumseh Park at 3:30. The city league schedule calls for two games on Friday afternoon, but it was decided to change the programme. In the east end league it was found impossible to pull off the scheduled afternoon contest between the Wortman & Ward vs. the Ortons, on account of the military exercises at Queen's Park at that time.

The local soccer season has closed, and the wind-up finds the Y. M. C. A. boys in the lead. The teams worked hard to give the local public good football, but the support they received was poor. There were times at the Houghtons when the games were witnessed by only the referee, the scorekeeper and the water-carrier.

Detroit was the last of the major league teams to go over the shut-out route. Its first coat was applied on Monday by the Athletics, but it was not very thick, the score being 1 to 0. Yesterday, the hearts of the Detroit fans sank into their shoes as they saw their pets get the whitewash plastered over them to the tune of 3 to 0. Two shut-outs in as many days was enough to make the average Tiger rooter take to the tall timbers in the northern part of the state. Rube Waddell, the erratic, was on the pitching job for the Athletics yesterday, and he simply toyed with Hugh Jennings' boys.

Cleveland has sold Outfielder "Bunk" Congalton, formerly of the Canadian League, to Boston. Cleveland already had five outfielders before Delahanty was secured in trade yesterday from New York. Congalton hit .320 last season. He will play right field for Boston, Grimshaw probably going on the bench for the present.

THIRD-SACKER GOT ASSIST ON STRIKEOUT

There have been many queer plays on the diamond, and every year brings out a new one, but one of the most unique was made on the Polo grounds, New York, last week, in the series with the Cincinnati Reds. A batter having struck out was thrown out at first by the third baseman. Can you beat it? It happened thus: White had struck at the ball three times. The last one was really a foul up, and struck Schiel on the shins, but the umpire did not hear it on account of his ear-muffs. The ball rolled in front of the plate, and thinking it a foul Schiel threw it to third, as is usually done when fouls are hit. To the astonishment of everybody, the umpire called a "strike," and Kane threw the ball over to first, and White was out. That is the first time on record that a third baseman ever got an assist on a strikeout.

LONGBOAT'S FAST RUN.

Toronto, May 21.—Tom Longboat went a fast two miles at the exhibition track this afternoon. He quickly did it step over the ground that the times were shown, and he was passed across the finishing line. He was unopposed, and ran in the face of a strong wind. That is the only record shown by the fact that the world's amateur record for the distance on a cinder track is 9 minutes 55 seconds, held by A. Shrubbs, and the professional record, 9:15.

Rowdiness at the Polo Grounds in Which Assault Was Made on Umpires.

New York, May 21.—A pistol shot, mounted cop, infantry cops, and Pinkerton men all figured in a disorderly outbreak that followed the baseball game between New York and Chicago National League clubs at the Polo grounds this afternoon. Umpires have had troubles with crowds here before, but today was the first time a gun has been brought into action at a big league ball game in New York.

City cops are not assigned to the Polo grounds, this season, owing to the decision of Commissioner Bingham that it is not up to him to police private grounds. But the crowd was big today, and the police were close by in case of need. Two of them put in an appearance as soon as the game was over, and bore the two umpires close company as the latter left the field for their dressing-room.

Assault Made on Umpires.

The crowd, several thousand strong, closed in on the umpires, Hank O'Day and Bob Emalle, and their bodyguard, throwing bottles, cushions and newspapers, and giving vent to loud expressions of displeasure with the two officials of the game, whose decisions had not been pleasing to them. The police would not let the crowd go any further than the entrance to the passage-way leading to the dressing room. It was there that one of the cops reached back, yanked out his gun and fired in the air. He had more room after

the play with the weapon, and the missile-throwing ceased with suddenness.

"Take the 'cop's' number!" yelled a spectator, and this one man proceeded to do. Chaperoned by Police. Meanwhile the riotous scene had brought other police to the grounds, and a mounted policeman from the Speedway. The equestrian scattered the crowd, but a thousand or more men and boys stood around until the umpires emerged to go across to the gate at the clubhouse. Hank and Bob smoked cigars unconcernedly as they trudged across the plain, flanked by cops, and with the crowd tagging at their heels. Pebbles and papers followed them at every step, and one paper knocked off Emalle's hat, and one pebble struck a cop's helmet. Up the runway and clear to the elevated train at One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street station, the umpires went chaperoned by the cops.

Tied for First Place.

Chicago won the game, 3 to 2, the contest being a close one all the way through, as the score indicates. The home team outthrew the visitors, and got away in the lead, but the champions virtually decided the result in the fourth inning, when they bunched hits for two runs. They scored another in the seventh. New York got one in the eighth, and every close decision that was made while this rally was on was distorted by the home fans into robbery of their club, resulting in the riot. Both Brown and Mathewson, old-time rivals, and the respective stars of their teams, pitched fine ball. The result was to tie Chicago and New York for the lead in the league race. It was their first meeting this year. There are two more to be played in this series.

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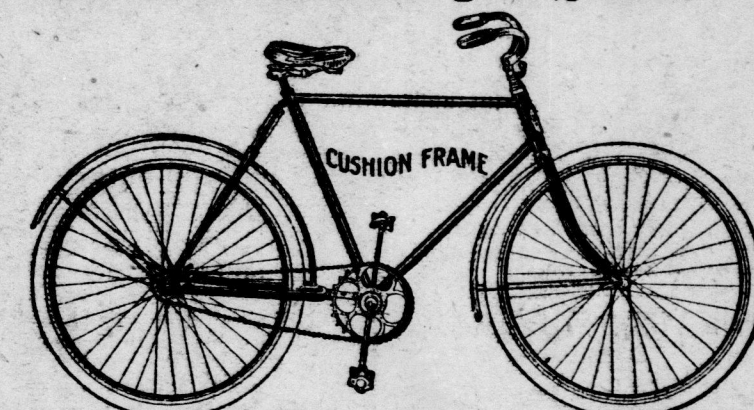
