## CHURCH OF ENGLAND TO CELEBRATE DIOCESE OF HURON'S JUBILEE

First Bishop, Dr. Cronyn, Consecrated in 1857.

Rise and Growth of the Church in Western Ontario.

The year 1907 will be a year of great interest to the Church of England people in this part of Canada, and already an organized effort is being made to celebrate the event by special services, and by raising \$20,000 for the Episcopal fund. On the 27th October, 1907, the Diocese of Huron will have been organized and working for fifty years. That is, fifty years ago the first Bishop of Huron, Benjamin Cronyn, D.D., went over to the old land, and in Lambeth Palace was consecrated the first Bishop of Huron by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Looking back over these years, it is interesting to think how marvelous has been the development of our land and of our church. Why, it was less than a century before that the whole of this part of Canada was part of the dominions of France. In 1797 there was only one bishop for all Canada, the first Bishop Inglis, of Nova Scotia. In 1793 there was only one bishop for all Canada west of Nova Scotia. In 1833 there was only one bishop for all Canada west of Quebec, and in 1870 there was only one bishop for the vast northwest. In 1880 there were only three clergymen of the Church of England in Canada west of Montreal; and in 1906, in what is now the Diocese of Huron, there were only two clergymen; what is now London being practically an untrodden forest, the home of the deer and the bear.

After 1820, this part of Canada began to be peopled very rapidly. In the year 1815 Napoleon was crushed at the Battle of Waterloo, and it is curious to think that a battle fought between a lot of soldiers in a little valley on a little sloping hillside in the insignificant country of Belgium should have affected so vastly the fortunes of this western land. But it was so. For after Napoleon was crushed a large number of retired and unemployed army officers and soldiers got it into their heads to emigrate and come out to this country. Other causes also induced many English, Irish and Scotch emigrants to fill up our land. And so by the year 1844, though this part of Canada was far from being the garden that it is today, there was an increasing population and twenty-six of our clergy, among them being such well-known names among our church people as the Rev. Mr. Boomer, the Rev. Mr. Erough, Mr. Plover, the Rev. Dr. Evans, the Rev. B. Cronyn, and old Archdeacon Marsh, who passed away only this week in the 81st year of his age.

In 1857 a great change came over the constitution of the Church of England in this part of the world. Previous to this time nobody ever dreamed of getting a bishop in any other way than they did of getting a governor, a magistrate, or a judge. The bishops were appointed by the crown, and they were sent over from England to govern the Church of England in this land. But about that time a new state of things set in, and as Tennyson says:

"The old order changeth, giving place to the new,  
And God fulfills himself in many ways."

The bishops were no longer to be appointed by the Government, and the

### NOT GOING TO BALTIC

Russia Gives the Hint and British Fleet Will Stay Away.

St. Petersburg, July 13.—The decision on the part of Great Britain to postpone the sailing of the British fleet to Russia was reached upon Russia's initiative, which pointed out that the projected visit had been welcomed with little satisfaction by the Russian Government, which saw in it an expression of sympathy for Russia on the part of Great Britain.

Unfortunately, it is added, certain political parties in Great Britain and Russia fomented a sharp agitation, with a view to connecting the visit with questions of Russian internal policy. The firm and loyal stand of the British minister for foreign affairs, Sir Edward Grey, brought the question back to its proper ground, and was appreciated here at its proper value.

Nevertheless, in view of the political crisis which is passing over Russia, it could not help foreseeing that the arrival of British ships at a Russian port might cause a recrudescence of the agitation and incidents of a nature to harm the true relations of Great Britain and Russia.

Cordial telegrams have been exchanged between King Edward and Emperor Nicholas.

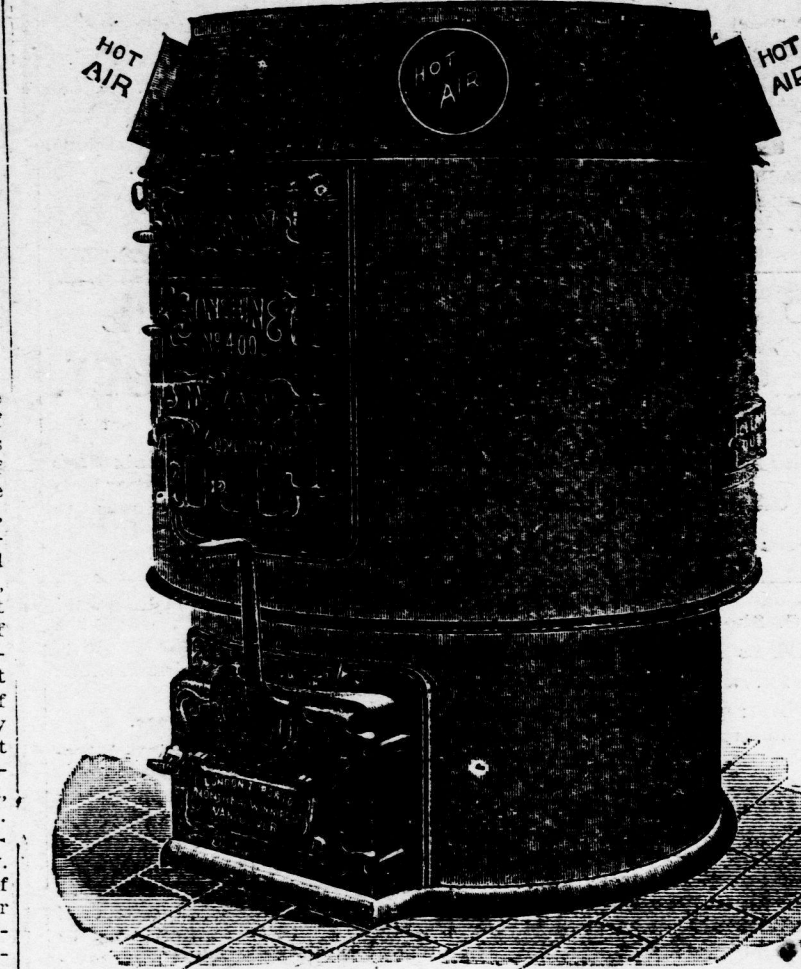

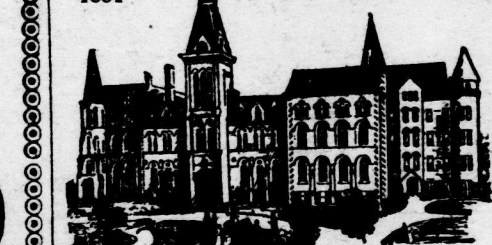
