INTERNAL DISORDERS HAVE BROKEN OUT IN TURKEY MURDERER WHO ESCAPED FROM TORONTO JAIL STILL AT LARGE

MASSACRE OF ARMENIANS IS FEARED; BANDS OF BRIGANDS ARE NOW DOMINATING TURKEY

Internal Disorder in the Enemy Country Is Causing Grave Anxiety, According to Reports Received From British Admiral—Young Turks Are Behind Movement.

London, April 17.—It is learned here that the situation in Turkey is causing grave anxiety. Internal disorder is rife, according to reports from Rear Admiral Webb, R. N., at Constantinople. It is feared there will shortly be outbreaks and massacres of the Armenian population on a large scale.

The situation at Smyrna, where the Turks and Greeks are ready to spring at each other's throats, is typical of the situation throughout Turkey. Bands of brigands are dominating the country, even within a few miles of Constantinople and committing atrocious murders.

The committee of union and progress, the Young Turk organization, which was driven from power in Constantinople as a result of the Allied victory, is reported to be secretly conducting an energetic reorganizing movement.

Further disorders are feared in Egypt. A division of British troops is on the way from the Dardanelles to reinforce the troops of Major General Allenby, the special high commissioner to Egypt, and to relieve a large number of Australian and New Zealand soldiers, who will return home.

BRITISH GENERAL ORDERS GERMANS TO RESUME WORK

Sir Herbert Plumer Issues a Proclamation in Rhine District.

Cologne, April 16.—In consequence of the spread of the German strikes to the Cologne district, Sir Herbert Plumer, in command of the British forces on the Rhine, issued a proclamation today ordering the immediate return of the men to work and threatening the strongest measures against persons promoting or countenancing strikes in the British zone of occupation. The general ordered military mediation of other means of settlement failed.

A squadron of British airplanes flew over the affected district today.

AVIATORS MAY START ON TRANS-ATLANTIC TRIP THIS AFTERNOON

Word Is Awaited as to "Aerial Breakers" Over Ocean.

St. John's, Nfld., April 17.—Weather conditions favorable for flying prevailed here today. Capt. Frederick P. Raynham, British aviator, and Harry G. Hawker, his Australian rival for transatlantic flight honors, looked for incoming reports for word as to whether "aerial breakers" over the ocean would permit them to "hop off" soon. Raynham was preparing early in the day to make the most of the local atmospheric clearing by a trial flight which could be held without loss of time. The flight was expected to take place at 10 o'clock.

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ALL LONG SERVICE MEN WILL BE BACK BEFORE TWO MONTHS

London, April 17.—The demobilization of the Canadian troops is proceeding so rapidly, and future arrangements are so well advanced for dealing with the situation when the St. Lawrence route is opened to navigation, that the numbers returning in May should exceed the numbers repatriated in April.

Barring unforeseen circumstances, practically all the long-service men will either be in Canada or en route within two months.

The demobilization scheme for the Canadian forces will, in fact, be carried out in much less than half the time originally estimated.

HOLIDAY TO BE PROCLAIMED ON DAY OF 1ST'S ARRIVAL HERE: MAY BE EITHER A HALF OR FULL DAY

Proclamation Prepared To Be Issued As Soon As the Date Is Certain—All Returned Men and Soldiers To Assemble At Princess Avenue Barracks.

Mayor C. B. Somerville declares that if the 1st Battalion returns to the city early in the day or any time before noon, a full holiday will be proclaimed. However, the battalion arrives after noon, only a half-holiday will be given. Chairman J. S. Barnard of the board of education states that as yet nothing definite has been done in reference to having the school children take part in the reception. The board does not know what is desired by the reception committee, he says. He is planning to get this information and will then immediately make the necessary preparations for the children.

Proclamation Prepared. In anticipation of the reception, a proclamation has been prepared and will be issued as soon as definite word is received of the date of the arrival in London of the battalion. Following is a gist of the proclamation: All returned men, and all members of the military will assemble at the Princess Avenue Barracks, where all arrangements for the position in the parade will be made by the D. A. C. and the Q. M. G. of Military District No. 1. All bands will also assemble at the Princess Avenue School. The following bands have been asked to take part in the parade: G. W. V. A., 7th Regiment, Hussars, Sgt. McDonald's Pipe Band, Italian and Salvation Army, Reliance and friends of the returning men are asked to assemble at Carling Heights, where provision will be made for such as to meet their soldier heroes. No citizens will be allowed on the station platform on the arrival of the train.

Reception at Heights. The civic reception will be held at Carling Heights, where all parties are requested to assemble on the arrival of the train.

It is planned for the parade to proceed from the railway station via Richmond to the parade ground at Carling Heights, where the parade will be held.

Citizens in general are asked to decorate their residences and places of business, especially along the route of the march. No vehicular traffic will be allowed on the route during the parade.

All Now Ready. The members of the First Battalion are now ready to receive their marching orders. The participation by all men of the unit who have already returned in the parade will be a feature of the day.

GERMAN EX-CROWN PRINCESS SEEKING DIVORCE, CHARGES HUSBAND WITH INFIDELITY

Mother of Former Princess Declares That Frederick William On Numerous Occasions Treated His Wife With Actual Violence, Leaving Her Bruised and Disfigured by His Cruel Blows.

Zurich, April 17.—The former German Crown Princess Cecilie has taken steps to divorce her husband, Frederick William, according to a statement given to Swiss newspapers by the former Grand Duchess Anastasia of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, mother of the former crown princess. The statement says that up to this time had prevented her from carrying it out. The statement of the grand duchess charges Frederick with cruelty to his wife, saying, "On one occasion some time ago the situation became so unbearable that my daughter actually fled from her home. She almost succeeded in reaching Switzerland. Orders were sent from Berlin to intercept her and she was captured at the German frontier. My daughter would be able to prove before the German court overwhelming evidence of the grossest cruelty against him. My daughter is a woman of noble birth and there is abundant proof of them. His brutality was atrocious. On more than one occasion my daughter was treated with actual violence. She was bruised and her face was disfigured by her husband's blows."

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1,800 MURDERED BY BOLSHIEVIKI AT CITY OF UFA

Four Hundred Women Are Included Among Those Slain.

London, April 17.—Eighteen hundred persons, including 400 women, were murdered by the Bolsheviks at Ufa, according to a telegram from Omsk received in official quarters here. Ufa, one of the principal cities in the Orenburg district, near the Siberian border, was taken by the Bolsheviks early this spring, but late in the spring was recaptured by forces of the Omsk All-Russian government, which have continued to press back the Bolsheviks in the region. Dispatches from Omsk dated April 5 and received on Tuesday announced the massacre by the Bolsheviks of more than 2,000 civilians in and near the town of Omsk, to the north of Ufa, in this district.

FRANK MCCULLOUGH, ESCAPED MURDERER, IS STILL AT LARGE

Toronto Police Believe He Is Many Miles From That City.

OTHER PEOPLE DIFFER

Wife of Night Watch Receives Returned Soldier Buttons.

Toronto, April 17.—There is little news today in connection with the hunt for Frank McCullough, who escaped from Toronto jail yesterday, except that he is still at large. This morning Mrs. Curran, wife of the night watchman who was on duty when McCullough escaped, received through the post his husband's returned soldier buttons, with a letter in the same handwriting as the one received through the post yesterday. Last night a small boy found a lady's valuable watch and expensive fob a few feet from the spot where McCullough jumped clear of fall property. Some people incline to the opinion that McCullough is still in Toronto, while police declare that he is probably many miles away.

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GERMANY TO CLAIM INDEMNITY FROM ALLIES FOR AIR ATTACKS AND DELAY IN CONCLUDING PEACE

Delegates To Be Sent To Versailles Will Submit Claims For Payment of Damages Due To the Occupation of Enemy Territory.

Paris, April 17.—Germany intends to claim an indemnity from the Allies, according to the Frankfort Gazette. It says the German negotiators at Versailles will ask payment for damages sustained from aerial attacks, from the occupation of German territory by the Allied troops and for the delay in concluding peace, causing a prolongation of the Bolshevik and Spartan trouble.

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
