





The First Exclusive Spark Plug Factory Opened At Windsor, Ont.

Canada's first factory for the exclusive manufacture of spark plugs has been opened at Windsor, Ont., by The Champion Spark Plug Company of Canada, Limited. The Mayor of Windsor, Mr. E. B. Winter, officiated and set the machinery in motion. Building operations began last June, when Mayor Winter turned the first sod. The building which has a frontage of about seventy-five feet with a depth of about one nunared and fifty feet is of cement and steel, and thoroughly up-to-date with an abundance of light and

With the exception of the porcelain, With the exception of the porcelain, each part of the spark plug is manufactured and all assembling is done at this new plant. The capacity is estimated at 40,000 complete plugs a day and will employ 150 persons.

UNITED CAMPAIGN BY 25 ORGANIZATIONS FOR WELFARE WORK

Will Make Joint Appeal To Citizens For Funds.

With twenty-five organizations represented, the United Welfare Fund Association of London was incorporated at a meeting held in the Chamber of Commerce rooms Monday evening. The object of the new organization is to raise by joint campaign, or campaigns held from time to time, funds for public welfare organizations, supported wholly or in part by public subscriptions. The first campaign of the association will be held some time in May, when an effort will be made to secure sufficient Fast Game At Kingston Ends funds to carry on the work of all or-

ganizations, which it embraces, for one year. The association will permit the designation of subscriptions to particular welfare organizations, but will strongly discourage this.


