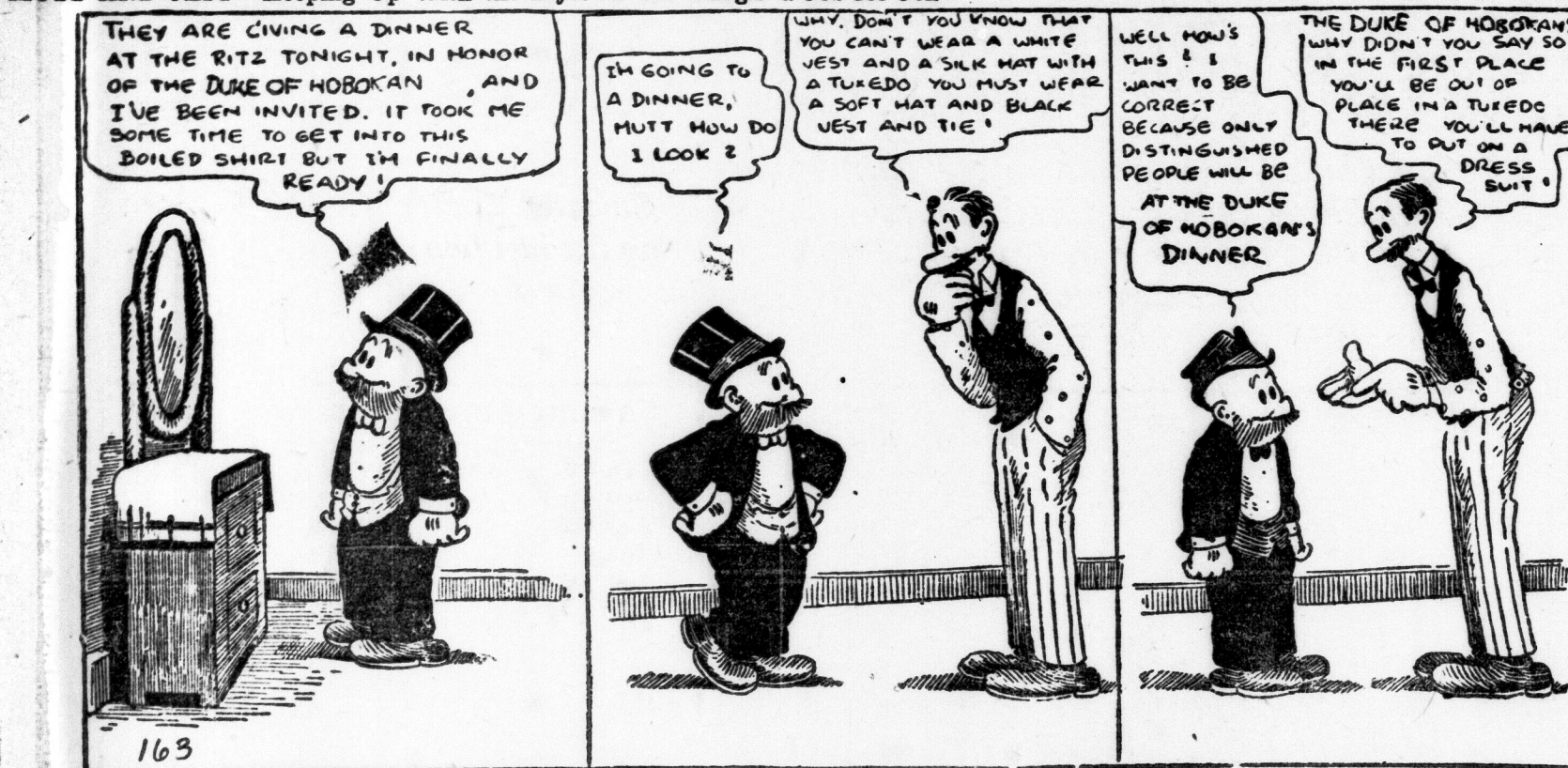

LEWIS IN BIG BOUT

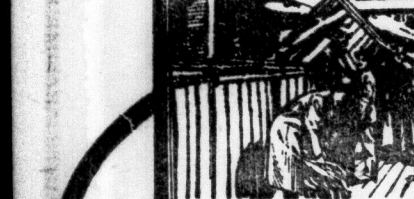
