"TIGERS" SEVERE LOSS CAPT. BALLARD HURT

Shoulder Blade Broken In Practice Tackle—The Cataract and the People—Happenings.

HAMILTON, Sept. 15.—(Special).—George W. Ballard, the doughty little captain and quarterback of the Senior Tigers, met with an accident while at practice this evening that will keep him out of the game for at least a month. The ball was dribbled across the field, and Ballard dashed after it. George Wrey, captain of the intermediates, took after him, made a low tackle and dumped Ballard over on his shoulder, breaking the shoulder blade. The mishap will prove a serious handicap to the team, which will be without Ballard's services for the opening games at least. He has handled the team for several seasons, and given all the signals.
