





## The Lindsay Arsenal Contract

An issue has been raised by Construction in connection with the erection of the new government arsenal at Lindsay, which touches the interests abundance, and we rely on the miner of architects, engineers and other professional men of similar status. The to vastly increase this output. complaint is that the contract having been let to a New York firm, Canadian professional men are precluded from having any part in the superintendence of work thus done in their own country, altho when Canadian firms obtain a contract across the border they are compelled to engage United States engineers or architects to carry out arming of Canadian troops with the their plans.

The example of a Hamilton architect is cited, who competed for and won a competition for a building across the line, but he was not allowed to enter the United States to superintend the erection of the building. The United States labor law places architect, engineer, contractor and mechanic all in the same class. Construction asks that the Dominion labor law be conformed to this condition of affairs and made retaliatory.

We do not see how the competitive system of tendering can be restricted proved to us. to exclude all but Canadians without bringing about worse conditions than it is sought to remedy. As long as which the tariff provides, and labor is Canadian, for which the alien labor law provides, the only difficulty is in the case of architect and engineer.
