with continued liberality from many friends of the "Home," is most gratefully acknowledged; and to all who have been associated with them in this labor of love the Committee tender their sincere thanks.

The Board takes this opportunity also of thanking Mr. Huson Murray, its solicitor, for the many services rendered by him to the "Home;" Drs. Ogden and Macdonald, for their generous consideration of those requiring medical aid, and the kind friends who every Sunday assist in the religious instruction of the children.

In conclusion, the Managers would call attention to the Treasurer's Report, containing a full and satisfactory account of the financial affairs of the Institution. As a whole, the record of the past year's operations of this charity shows, if anything, increased and wider beneficence, and responsibilities for the future very much greater: but the Managers earnestly hope that, in taking these additional burthens upon themselves, they will be strengthened by the active sympathy and warm, helpful liberality of the charitable public of Toronto.
