DEMANDS FAIR PLAY FOR THE SCHOONERS

(Charlottetown Patriot.)

We have received a letter from A. G. Baillie of Port Hastings, N. S. demanding equal rights for the schooner owners of the maritime provinces. It appears that coal companies, discriminate against sailing vessels. This is a long standing complaint. The effect of such treatment is disastrous to trade, to the owners and charterers of vessels and in many cases consignees of cargoes.

Very often it has been necessary for small schooners to wait for weeks to get a chance to load, although in some instances cargoes have been booked. The only excuse offered was the desire to load the steamers which were in port, some of which had come in long after the schooners.
