

CARGO OF GAS OIL GOES TO MONTREAL

Shipment of Million and Half Gallons Being Unloaded From Tanker

MONTREAL, Sept. 11 — For the first time since the Sun Qil Company, Limited, became established in Canada, they are bringing in a cargo of gas oil for general distribution in Mon-treal. The oil tanker Dixiano arrived on Wednesday morning from Marcus Hook refinery in Delaware Bay, Pa., and is now unloading a cargo of a million and a half gallons at Section 84.

The Sun Oil Co., Ltd., have recently leased the 2,250,000-gallon tankage space of the Montreal Light, Heat and Power plant at Hochelaga, and will make distribution from there in addition to their own tankage space on St. Patrick street, where oil is unloaded
