Tablets commemorating Robert Foulis and Benjamin F. Tibbits and their inventions are to be erected in the city by the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada, it was announced by Dr. J. C. Webster on the occasion of his public address in the Vocational School on Thursday evening. Robert Foulis was the inventor of the first steam fog alarm in the world, which was built at Partridge Island at the entrance to Saint John harbor. Benjamin F. Tibbits discovered how to unite high and low pressures of steam and made the

For a time he lived in Halifax and obtained considerable reputation as a portrait painter. burned on Grand Lake.
