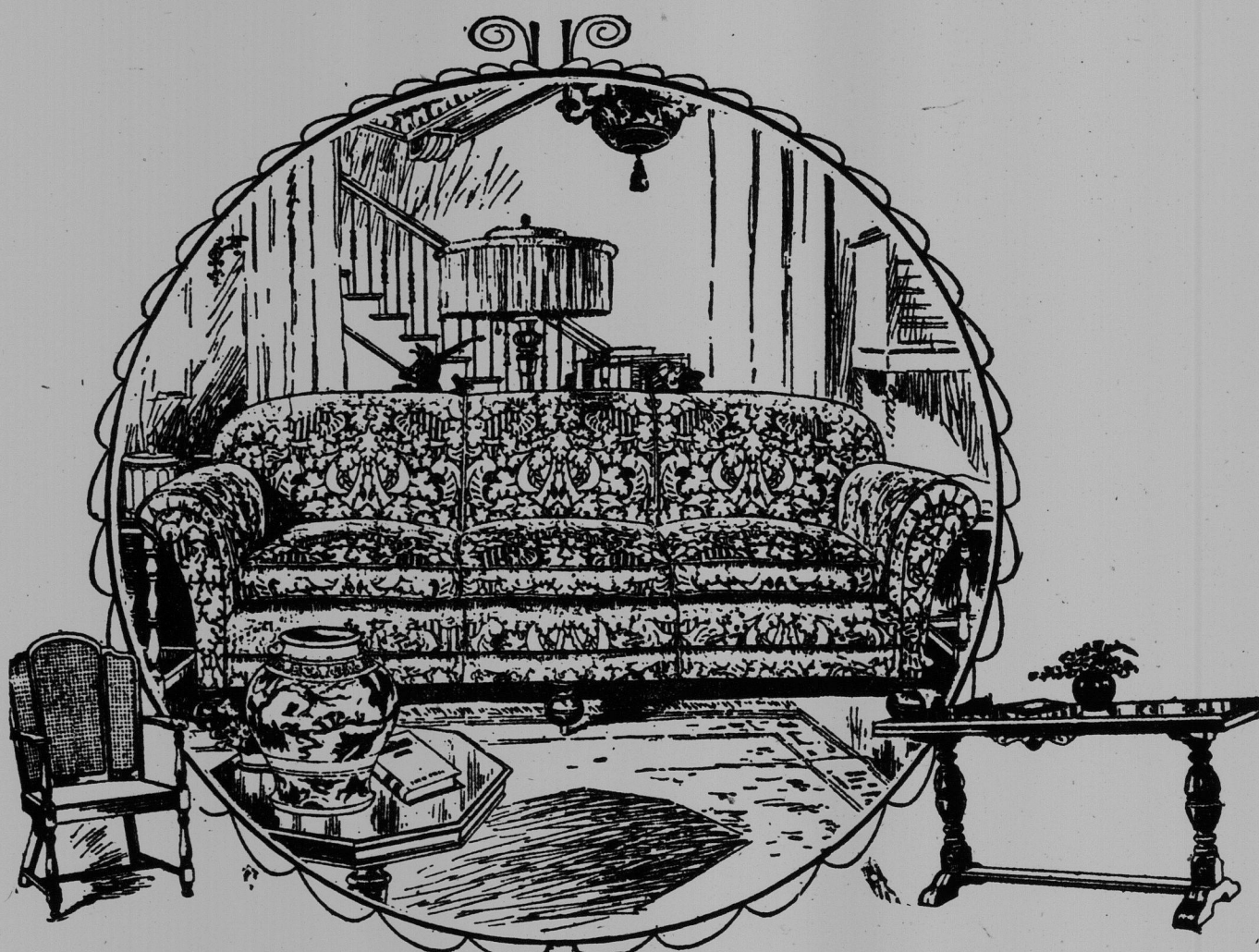

"I am Pleased to Visit Canada," Remarks Duchess of Atholl On Arrival at Saint John Port

AS the palatial Canadian Pacific steamship Montcalm glided into her dock at West Saint John yesterday morning hundreds of people had their first glimpse of Canada with her mantle of glistening white snow. Among the number was a distinguished party of British and French delegates to the third triennial National Conference of Education, which is to be held in Montreal from April 6 to April 10.

They were headed by Her Grace the Duchess of Atholl, a very charming and gifted lady, who is visiting this Dominion for the first time.

As she stepped on shore, she said: "I am pleased to visit Canada, a country in which I spent so much of my childhood through the pages of J. Fenimore Cooper's works, and I am looking forward with great interest to visit some of the places and scenes so familiar which will bring back to me happy associations in his novels."

OTHERS IN PARTY

Other members of this distinguished party were: Sir Hugh Percy Allen, the great English musician, who, besides being director of the Royal College of Music and professor of music at Oxford University, has the distinction of conducting the famous Bach choir.

The French delegation comprising the party was headed by Senator Andre Honnorat, Minister of Public Instruction during the war. With him was Jean Bruhnes, a prominent educationist of the University of Paris; E. Gilson and P. Gadmer, also of Paris, Miss Morley Fletcher, of London, was also with the party.

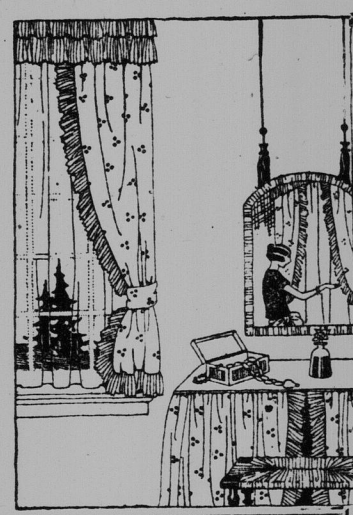

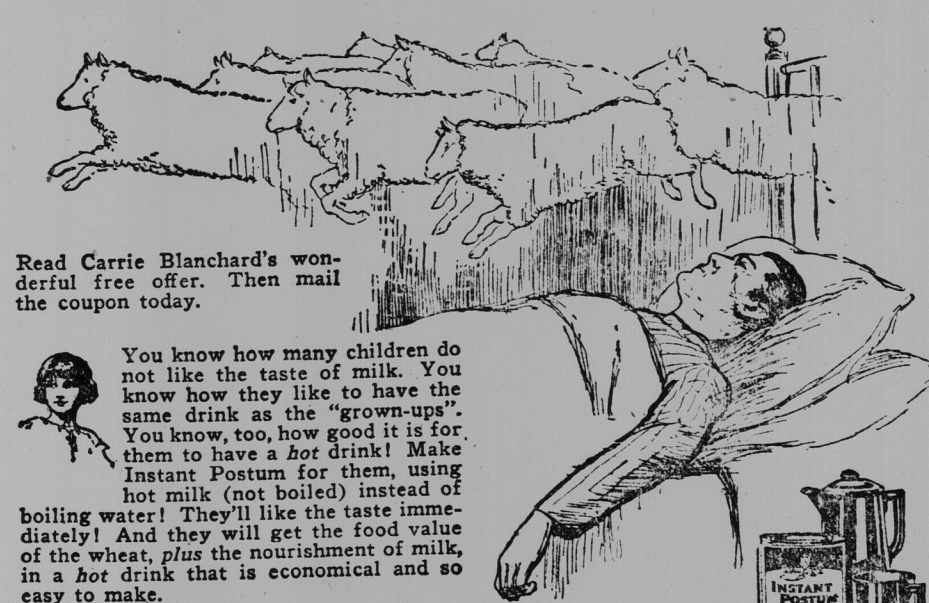
