## ROBBER NEAR DEATH AFTER KILLING BOY AND NETTING \$2,000

Those Injured Are Rooming House Proprietor and Detective Chief

## ANOTHER ARRESTED FOR INVESTIGATION

Thug Opens Fire From Window as Police Arrive; Fight Lasts 10 Minutes

WINNIPEG, May 28.—After the most desperate gun battle in the annals of the Winnipeg police department, William Davis, an Italian, who a few hours previously had held up the Logan Avenue branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, killing Maurice Garvie, a 19-year-old clerk, and escaping with \$2,000 in currency, was captured this afternoon at a rooming house a short distance from the scene of the murder.

In attempting to escape from the house, Davis was probably fatally wounded. A hospital report this evening said that his condition was "very grave."

**CHIEF OUT OF HOSPITAL**

Chief of Detectives George Smith, who was wounded while leading his men in the attack on the house where Davis had taken refuge, was released from hospital this afternoon. First reports said he had been dangerously wounded, but the bandit's bullet hit

him on the right shoulder and glanced off, inflicting only a minor cut. He returned to duty.

Robert Segal, proprietor of the rooming house, wounded when the police returned the gunman's fire, is in hospital, shot in the chest. His condition is serious. The bandit had been rooming at Segal's house for the past few weeks.

## ONE ARRESTED

A man found by police loitering in the vicinity of the bank and who was unable to give a satisfactory explanation of his presence there, was taken into custody, pending investigation. His name has not been divulged.

The gun battle in front of the house lasted about ten minutes.

Two hours after the killing of Garvie, police obtained information as to the whereabouts of the wanted man. Under command of Chief Smith, a squad of detectives and constables advanced on the house. Immediately the bandit opened fire from an upstairs window, and shortly afterwards commenced shooting from a doorway.

Smith was the first to fall, but under the leadership of Detective Bert Morris, the police squad continued to close in on the house. The bandit was finally driven from his refuge by a fearless advance on the part of Detective Morris, who, in the face of a hail of bullets, pumped out of the front hallway by the peened bandit, strode forward through the fire and forced his way through the back way.

Escaping manically from the brave fire poured on him by police, the gunman crouched low and ran across vacant lots, still firing as he ran and discharging one revolver when he had emptied it. Just as he was attempting to jump into a parked car, a well placed shot by Detective James Thompson crumpled him, and he stretched full length on the roadway. An examination showed that he had two wounds, one in the arm and the other in the chest.

The killing of Garvie was cold-blooded. Entering the bank at about 10:30 o'clock this morning the gunman shouted for the employees to "put 'em up" and "shell out." The youth was shot when he did not at once obey the command. Before he had time to act, a bullet crashed into him, sending him to the floor dead. Death was instantaneous.

After killing Garvie, the bandit forced M. P. Johnson, the teller, to hand over \$2,000 and made his exit from the bank. A taxi, in which he had arrived, was waiting outside the bank door, but becoming aware of the robbery, the driver refused to start the car. Firing at the taxi driver, the bandit ran down a back lane and presumably at once took refuge at his rooming house, which is half a block from the bank. The driver was not injured.

The money which was obtained in the robbery was found in Joe's pockets after he was captured.

## BANK OF MONTREAL DEPOSITS INCREASE

Savings Accounts Reach \$632,412,154 Against \$604,881,114 Year Ago

That the general business of the country is on the up-grade is reflected by the semi-annual statement of the Bank of Montreal.

The report, which is for the six months to April 30, is now going forward to shareholders. At the last annual meeting Sir Vincent Meredith, the president, stated that there were then indications of better business conditions. This has proved to be the case and as a result, the customers of the bank have been able to profitably use increased accommodation.

The general statement of assets and liabilities shows total assets of \$749,132,357, up from \$718,142,291 at the corresponding period a year ago. Of this amount liquid assets are \$468,130,200, equal to 62.5% of liabilities to the public, while holdings of gold and cash are \$81,720,618, as against \$72,123,238. This increase in loans has been taken care of by a reduction in holdings of securities.

It is the large gain in savings deposits which has brought total deposits up to \$622,412,154, from \$604,881,114. Of this amount savings deposits represent \$180,463,281, and show an increase from \$175,294,154.

With the improved trade conditions and the larger business handled, there have also shown a tendency to increase.
